SPEAKER CANNON EXPLAINS **POSITION ON TARIFF REFORM**

Washington, April 6.—Speaker Can-non today made a further explanation of a letter recently written by him to a friend in East Liverpool, Ohio, regard-ing the tariff. The letter was published and seemed to indicate that the tariff eather a gould reachaly come in the first revision would probably come in the fu-

The statement of the speaker today follows:

"I was not aware that I was writing a letter for publication, although I have no objection to its publication. There are many people in the country who be-lieve that a single schedule, or a few schedules, of the tariff may be amend-ed. This is entirely impracticable, for while an amendment to a single schedule might please a single interest, it could not command enough votes to en-act it.

"In my judgment nothing can be dons except by a complete revision of the tariff which would be a compromise that would command a majority vote of those 386 members of the house and of those 336 members of the house and the 90 senators. The enactment of such a revision and the time necessary to adjust it to conditions would halt pro-duction, consumption and commerce for at least 12 months, and when the com-promise is enacted, as a whole, it will probably not be an improvement on ex-isting law. I don't believe a majority of the people at this time desire to in-terfere with the present conditions which are the most prosperous conditions we have had in the republic to the laborer, to the farmer, to the capitalist, to the producer and to the consumer.
