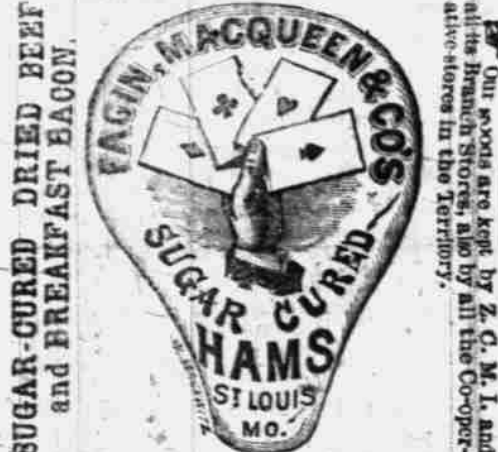

Last Night's Dispatches.
CONGRESSIONAL.
SENATE.
After the U. P. R. R. Bankrupt
Bill Passed Yesterday.

WASHINGTON, 10.—Today presented
a joint resolution of the legisla-
ture of Missouri, in regard to illegal
charges made by the Union Pacific
R. R. Co.; referred. In presenting
the resolution, the speaker hoped
the judiciary committee would give
the subject early attention, and
give the proper construction to the
acts of Congress granting a subsidy
to that road.

The consideration of the bank-
ruptcy bill was resumed, and after
the adoption of further amendments
the bill was passed. It now goes to
the House for concurrence.

West presented a memorial from
the New Orleans Chamber of Com-
merce, asking for an appropriation
to re-open the mint at New Orleans;
referred.

Gordon introduced a bill to re-
lieve the political disabilities of
Raphael Semmes, of the Alabama;
referred.

Stewart submitted a resolution,
requesting the Secretary of the
Treasury to inform the Senate what
time would be required, after the
resumption of specie payment, to
enable the mint to manufacture
enough silver coin to replace the
fractional currency; agreed to.

Cameron, from the Finance com-
mittee, reported, without amend-
ment, the House bill re-
questing the President to extend,
in the name of the U. S., a cordial
invitation to foreign nations to take
part in the Centennial Exposition
at Philadelphia.

Jones introduced a bill authorizing
the college of twenty cent avoirdupois
pieces; it proposes to make them
legal tender at their nominal value
for amounts not exceeding five dol-
lars in any one payment, and ap-
plies to the new coin all the ex-
isting laws relating to coinage,
assessments or counterfeiting; re-
ferred.

HOUSE.
Postal—Personal Explanation.
Stowell, from the postal commit-
tee, reported favorably to the bill
permitting the name and address
of the sender, and the number and
kind of articles enclosed on a wrap-
per of newspapers, books, &c., with-
out extra postage.

Butler, of Mass., in a personal
explanation, contradicted certain
reports in reference to himself, tel-
graphed from Washington to cer-
tain New Orleans papers, character-
izing them as false in every particu-
lar.

Indian Hostilities.
Ft. Laramie, 10.—A report came
in at 8:30 last evening, by a courier
from a pack train, that about ten
miles from the mill, Lt. Robinson
and Corporal Coleman were sur-
rounded by about forty Indians; a
private named Niles was near by,
and says that the last seen of Rob-
inson was that he was leaning for-
ward in his saddle and Indian
very close, firing at him. Rob-
inson and the Corporal ran toward
the mill. Niles ran toward the
train, which was about five miles
north of where the attack was made.
His horse was shot and killed, he
running the remainder of the dis-
tance on foot. The Indians were
seen to be a scalp dance.

New York, 10.—The trial of
John C. Simmonds, for killing M.
Dunne, December, 1872, came on
in the court of oyer and terminer
this morning. Both parties, it will
be remembered, were lawyers, and
they quarrelled about business,
when Simmonds stabbed and
killed Dunne.
