LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

City Council.—Regular meeting of the City Council to-night, at seven o'clock.

Gone South.—Superintendent W. A. Douglass, of the Deseret Telegraph, has gone south, for the purpose of inspecting the line. He will visit St. George and Ploche.

The Other Place.—Yesterday, he stated that the Methodist and Presbyterian schools intended opening Friday at Lindsey's. We understand our informant was mistaken. They are going to Fuller's Hill.

Changing.—In accordance with the petition of William B. Barton, that portion of the lower branch of the 20th Ward ditch which ran through his lot is being removed a mile of rods south, and will run a line with the sidewalk. The location of the new channel for the stream is more desirable than the former one.

Postponed.—In consequence of the recent death occurring in the family of Bishop R. T. Burton, the concert for the benefit of the Welsh emigration fund, that was to have taken place at the 15th Ward Hall, to-morrow evening, is postponed till next Monday night, May 5th, commencing at eight o'clock.

Expected Home.—Anthony Godwin, Esq., having perfected arrangements for establishing a bank in this city, with capital obtained from Great Britain, is expected to reach home to-night. The new banking firm will probably occupy the building known as the Old First National Bank Building, north of Wallis, Fargo & Co's office.

Friesthood Meeting.—The monthly meeting of the priesthood of the 15th Stake, will be held in the fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms Saturday morning, May 4th, at 10 o'clock.

Bishops and others interested will please take notice and prepare their monthly statistical reports of their business accordingly.

Dust Laying.—A petition signed by a large number of business men the central part of the city, is sent to be presented to the City Council. It asks the privilege of laying the street sprinkling from the hydrants of the waterworks, instead of being obliged to resort to the half-fashioned water-pot method of laying the dust. The petitioners express a willingness to pay small special tax for the privilege.

Suicide.—About ten o'clock on Sunday morning Sergeant Frederick L. Hoffman, in charge of the United States Observatory at Ogden, deliberately committed suicide, by shooting himself through the head. The deed was committed in the presence of Mr. Angert and another gentleman, named Hoffman. Before drawing his weapon and putting the muzzle to his mouth, he presented Mr. Lehman, friend of his, with his watch, requesting him to take stand keep it. An inquest was held over the body by Coroner Joshua Williams and a jury, whose verdict was in accordance with the facts.

The remains were brought to this city for interment in the Camp Logan Cemetery.

The National Game Revived.—To-morrow afternoon, commencing at 3 o'clock, there will be a match game of base ball, on Washington Square, between two nine, selected from the members of the Metropolitan and Red Stocking clubs. Utah Northern Railroad has recently increased most astonishingly, even surpassing the satisfaction of the recent purchasers.

In place of three to four men being employed at the Ogden station, he hereafter, there are now a dozen men. On Friday night last there were four Union Pacific car loads of freight awaiting shipment to the northern end of the line. Two car loads of the U. P. can be loaded upon three of the narrow gauge. W. R. Doddridge, Esq., agent for the U. P. Company at Ogden, acts in that capacity also for the Utah Northern.

Since the Montana freight commenced to pass over the line, twenty new box cars have been placed on it. An engine from the Summit County line has been put on the road, in addition to the five already in use, and still another and twenty cars have been ordered. From ten to twenty car loads of freight are run over the line daily.

The forwarding home of Keeler Co., has removed from Corvallis to the terminus, at Round Valley, Kennedy & Co. are established to do same place. G. Macclay, who was the forwarding contract from the railroad company, for the delivery of freight in Montana, is so located there, doing a rushing business with teams.

The Utah Northern is now about 60 miles in length, being the longest Utah Railroad. The large and increasing business done by it will soon convince those who have been inclined to scepticism regarding the utility of narrow gauge railroads, that they are a good deal consequence after all.

Departed in Youth.—We regret to have to state that, shortly after seven o'clock this morning, Frank G. Barr, son of Robert T. Barr and Mrs. Burton, departed this life. The cause of death was inflammation of the brain.

His demise was somewhat sudden and unexpected, having only been taken ill last Thursday, at his father's farm, south of the city, where his demise occurred. Last evening he attended the meeting of the 15th Ward Improvement Society. The illness is supposed to have ensued from having caught a severe cold and from over-exertion at work.

About half past ten o'clock last night he suddenly awoke from a state of unconsciousness and spoke to his parents and all others around him, thanking them for their kindness and attention to him in his sickness, and blessing them all in the name of the Lord. His only desire to his family was that he might be enabled in helping to build up the work of God on the earth. Soon afterwards he sank into a comatose condition, from which he never revived.

His life was a record of exemplary habits and unquestioned integrity. He was in his 16th year in connection with the many friends of the family, we sympathize with them in their bereavement.

The funeral services will be conducted at the 15th Ward Hall at 2 p. m. on Thursday.

A Benefactor Act.—This morning Brother Elias Morris received, from Father Ormond, of Petersburg, Millard County, a letter, containing a check for \$140. This donation, Brother Morris being created, by the letter, to select one needy person; is South Wales and apply the money for their emigration with the first company of the season. Father Ormond also states that he will give a team and wagon up this day ready to convey the parties loaded to Petersburg, where he will take them on the road to their old or a home. He says it is the first time he has ever witnessed the money when promised, after their arrival, he will again apply the money to a similar purpose, in aiding some other poor ones to emigrate.

The money will be used for the benefit of Brother Thomas Jones, a President of the Marthian Branch of the Church, who has sufficient means to educate himself and family, lacking about a amount of Father Ormond's nation.

Father Ormond is between 70 and 80 years of age, and has "a heart that can feel for another."
