Departed in Youth.—We regret to have to state that, shortly after seven o'clock this morning, Frank G. Carr Burton, son of Robert T. and Sarah Burton, departed this life. The cause of death was inflammation of the brain.

His demise was somewhat sudden and unexpected, having only been taken ill last Thursday, at his father's farm, south of the city, where his demises occurred. Last Tuesday evening he attended the meeting of the 15th Ward Improvement Society. The illness is supposed to have ensued from having caught a severe cold and from over exertion at work.

About half past ten o'clock last night he suddenly awoke from a state of unconsciousness and spoke to his parents and all others around him, thanking them for their kindness and attention to him in his sickness, and blessing them all in the name of the Lord. His only desire to live, and was his sole object, was useful in helping to build up the work of God on the earth. Soon afterwards he sank into a comatose condition, from which he never awoke.

He was a youth of exemplary habits and unquestioned integrity. He was in his 16th year. In connection with many friends of the family, we sympathize with them in their bereavement.

The funeral services will be conducted at the 15th Ward Hall, at 11 a.m. on Thursday.

A Benevolent Act.—This morning Brother Elias Morris received, from Father Ormond of Petersburg, Millard County, a letter, containing a check for \$140. This was a donation, Mother Morris being directed, by the letter, to select some needy persons in South Wales and apply the money for their emigration with the first company of the season. He says if the parties receive the aid will return the money when possible, after their arrival, he will again apply the means to a similar purpose, in aiding some other poor persons to emigrate.

The money will be used for the benefit of Brother Thomas Jones, the President of the Methodist Branch of the Church, who has sufficient means to subdivide himself and family, lacking about the amount of Father Ormond's donation.

Father Ormond is between 70 and 80 years of age, and has a heart that can feel for another.

Editor's Desired Note.—Dear Brethren.—On the 6th Inst. our annual conference convened at

Railroad Items.—The business of the Utah Northern Railroad has lately increased most astonishingly, exceeding comfortable health, and finding thankful for the privilege of again meeting together, and enjoying each other's society for a short time after traveling and laboring exclusively among the natives for a period of months.

The different branches of the church upon the Islands of Hawaii, Maui, Molokai, Lanai, Oahu, and Kahoolawe, labor upon the island of Hawaii, brothers J. B. Woodbury and M. R. Hawall to labor upon the Islands of Maui, Molokai and Lanai, brothers Jacob Gates, Jr. and Nelsie to labor upon the Island of Kauai, and brother H. P. Richardson to labor upon the Island of Oahu. Deacon Moore and brother Joseph H. Dean will remain at the plantation, where they will be assisted alternately by brothers Richards and Gates, who will divide the time about equally between them.

Brother Molen is active and energetic, discharging his duties as foreman and teacher, and the elders, doing all in their power to make them comfortable and at home, besides teaching a native school, which is in successful operation.

Brother Dean is also a good and zealous missionary, and always ready to do all she can in her sphere to help along the good work upon these lands.

The principle of gathering, and the blessings to be derived therefrom, have been prominent features in the teachings of the elders of the primitive saints, for some time past, but recently however have manifested their faith by their works in gathering unto the place, according to the instructions which they have received. They are weak, fallible creatures, easily led into temptation, with seemingly no power, or but little desire on their part, to renounce the earthly propensities of their nature.
