LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mayor to Lead March—Mayor Dransford will lead the grand march at this evening's ball, given by the Carpenters' union, in the Odeon.

Attending Lumber Convention—Rev. and Mrs. P. A. Simpkins have gone to Tacoma, Wash., to attend the lumber convention being held there the current week. Mr. Simpkins is to make an address.

Chief Clerk Willcutt Recovers—Chief Clerk Charles D. Willcutt of the Bell Telephone company, has recovered from his indisposition and is able to be once more at his desk.

Funeral of Mrs. Farley—The funeral of Mrs. Julia Farley, who died at the residence of her son, Mr. J. S. Farley, yesterday afternoon, from the Salt Lake residence, Rev. Ryan conducting the services.

Employee Injured—Joe Nattress, an employee at the Utah Copper mill, was brought to St. Mark's hospital yesterday, suffering from a broken ankle and a gashed thigh occasioned by his being caught in an elevator shaft.

George Acock Dies at Washington—Word from Washington, D. C., states the death of George Acock of this city, aged 80, who remains with the ship to this city for interment. He leaves a wife and eight children. The deceased had resided in Salt Lake for 14 years.

New Maps Accurate—New wall maps of the Harriman system were received from Omaha, Neb., yesterday afternoon by the general passenger office of the Short Line. The different parts of the system are in different colors, with the non-Harriman lines in black. The maps are guaranteed as accurate.

Rio Grande Shoppers to Meet—Tomorrow night at the Federation of Labor hall the boiler makers, blacksmiths, and car builders employed at the Rio Grande shops in Salt Lake, will meet to discuss the plan for coming month. The fact that the company is laying them off so generally and is thought to be preparing to force reductions in wages, is the cause for the meeting. A plan of action against wage cuts will be worked out. The meeting will not be secret.

Returns from Jackson's Hole—Inspector R. E. Benedict of the forest service has returned from Jackson's Hole, Wyo., where he went to confer with the superintendent of the Teton division of the Yellowstone forest. The division will be divided into two districts, with headquarters of the new district at Jackson, Wyo. Mr. Benedict saw a herd of 2,000 elk while at the hole. The elk in that section are wintering well on account of the light snow which does not bury the feed, so it has not been necessary to guard hay supplies from these animals.

SOLD AT AUCTION.
Block of Utah National Bank Stock Goes Under Hammer.

A New York dispatch states that 500 shares of the Utah National bank of this city were sold at auction yesterday, along with shares of several New York banks. The affair is characterized as mysterious, and the theory is advanced that E. Augustus Holmes or one of his former co-workers was selling out stock that could not longer be carried, or that the stock offered was the collateral for a matured loan which had not been repaid. This was neither affirmed nor denied by those who conducted the sale. Mr. Holmes until October was president of the Mercantile bank and a director of the Utah National bank.

The Utah bank shares sold for \$93, Mr. McCormick stated last evening that he had not been notified of the sale of the stock.

RURAL DELIVERY RULES.
Patrons Urged to Provide Themselves With More Postage Money.

People who receive their mail by rural delivery carriers, and the carriers themselves will be interested in a circular recently issued by P. D. DeGraw, fourth assistant postmaster general, at Washington, D. C. The letter is in the form of a circular to postmasters, and reads as follows:

"In view of the numerous complaints which have reached the department of post office in the delivery of mail, and hardship imposed upon rural carriers while serving their routes, due to the practices of some patrons placing loose coins in their boxes for the purchase of stamps each time they desire to dispatch letters, you and the rural carriers under your supervision are directed to call the master to the attention of patrons and in a proper and polite manner urge that they provide themselves in advance with as liberal a supply of postage as circumstances will permit, and also suggest that patrons place in their boxes a small detachable cup of wood or tin in which to place coins when necessary in purchasing a supply of stamps."

NATIONAL GUARD TO LEARN OF WAR

Utah to Send Her Entire Force of Men to Crow Creek Reserve.

FOR OUTING WITH REGULARS.

To Join in Military Maneuvers With Militia of Three States.

Dates Set for Mobilization Are from August 1 to 15—Official Orders Will Issue Shortly.

With the efficiency of the National Guard at the highest point in its entire history, Utah's citizen soldiery is to have this season an outing on a larger scale than ever before attempted.

The growing friendliness between guardsmen and regular troops, and the increased watchfulness of the general government over militia commands, has resulted this year in arrangements for camp being made much more early than usual.

Utah will send her entire guard on a long journey to the Crow Creek Forest reserve, there to join in military maneuvers with the citizen soldiery of Wyoming, Idaho and Colorado, and with two regiments and one battalion of United States infantry, one field battery, one company of engineers, all participating in what is known as a provisional division campment.

DATES FOR MANEUVERS.
While the official orders are not yet published, it is known from authoritative sources that the dates for the joint maneuvers for the National Guard are from August 1 to 15, and the fact that the war department has already issued the order designating the nature of the work, allows Utah's guardsmen to get into form prior to leaving for the campment.

This is the second excursion of state troops out of the state. The first one however was not successful entirely because transportation facilities were poorly arranged, the food was not suited to men unaccustomed to field rations, and long delays in getting meals while aboard the train resulted in sickness. The orders for that encampment too, were received only a few weeks before the line of march was taken up to the point of entraining, so that no preliminary practice was possible.

NO RECRUITS NEEDED.
Utah's National Guard this year will not have to be recruited to make a complete outfit. The companies number straight down the alphabet without exception from A to H, with each ready now to prepare for the encampment. In addition to the first battery, the signal corps, the hospital corps, and the band, will go to camp. The totals force now numbers 500 men, the features which worked to the undoing of several years ago are totally absent.

OFFICERS INTERESTED.
The officers, upon whom the responsibility of getting the guard in form will rest, are: Adj. Gen. Wedgwood, head of the staff; Col. Plummer, active head of the line; Maj. Williams and Kammerman, First Infantry; Capt. Pexton, Company A; Capt. Nephi, Capt. A. W. Johnson, Company B; Capt. Ogden, Capt. Henry Eakle, Company C; at Salt Lake; Capt. L. P. Nelson, Company D; at Mt. Pleasant; Capt. Lafayette Morrison, Company E; at Richfield; Capt. C. W. Sidwell, Company F; at Mant; Capt. E. P. Bassett, Company H; Salt Lake; Capt. William C. Webb, First battery; Capt. E. Le Roy Bourne, signal corps; Capt. William D. Tyndale, hospital corps; Lieut. C. A. Arms, band.

ASSEMBLE IN SALT LAKE.
The Utah troops will probably be assembled in Salt Lake, except those from Ogden, and will leave on a military special for the camp grounds in order to arrive there at the date required by the orders. Col. Plummer, in order to prevent confusion in the handling of quartermaster supplies and commissaries will probably name the men to take charge of these departments this month, so that they may be studying up the problem before
