

## CONFERENCE OF RELIEF SOCIETY

Presidents of Various Stakes  
Tell of the Work Accomplished by Workers.

### MORE NURSES ARE REQUIRED

Superintendent Emma Empey Urges a Large Attendance at the Forthcoming Classes for Charity.

The general conference of the Relief society was held this morning in the Assembly hall, with President Bathsheba W. Smith presiding and a large number present. The pulpit was decorated with palms and potted plants, and above were hung the beautiful silk banner of the Relief society.

The services commenced with prayer and singing and the roll call was read by the secretary, Mrs. E. B. Wells. Mrs. Smith, the president, made the opening address, expressing her pleasure in meeting with the Relief workers and her conviction that the work would be blessed if they continued faithful and earnest.

Mrs. Annie Musser of Liberty stake followed with words of exhortation for the president and told of the love and reverence in which her name is held throughout the entire organization in the world. She spoke of the great work done by the society and said that charity was one of the most blessed of virtues and that the members are called of the Lord to cherish it and give it their best zeal and efforts.

ST. JOHN'S STAKE.  
Miss Mabel Cooper sang a beautiful song, "Scattered Sunshine," and was followed by Mrs. Udall of St. Johns stake, who said that it was not easy to come to the general conference, as the stake was a frontier one and the expense and effort were great. It takes four weeks to make a round of the stake, as the distances are great. She reported the Relief society in good condition with much interest in the work. They increased the attendance by starting weekly classes for study of Church works. They seemed anxious to study the gospel. Two members make monthly visits to auxiliary organizations and letters of greeting are sent to different wards annually and these with other things had helped to keep alive the interest.

WAYNE STAKE.  
Mrs. Grundy of Wayne stake said that she also had made a long journey to attend the conference, but knew she would be repaid. We have 10 societies and it takes two weeks to reach the

different parts; can only make one visit annually on account of bad roads; said that they were able to help in charitable work. In one case a widow's home was burned with all in it and the Relief society got together \$400 for her. "The society is also helping to build a new stake tabernacle. In private ways they are trying to set a worthy example. Mrs. Walker of the Rigby stake of Zion said that the stake was only just organized in March. There are now 254 members, six granaries with over 3,000 bushels of wheat; cash, \$1.10; real estate valued at about \$1,000, and some merchandise.

ONEIDA STAKE.  
Mrs. Louise Benson of Oneida stake said that they had nineteen societies and 675 members. Their work includes the mothers' classes with six members in charge of the lessons. They keep on with grain storing, have 13 granaries, and these are being improved. Meetings are well attended, and the general condition good. The society recently furnished 500 yards of carpeting for the temple. They also helped the academy sewing room—donating a cabinet for display of the work. Aid to the poor is the first object, and the meetings are well attended.

Mrs. Roundy of Ensign stake reported a very fine organization in her stake. Said that it was her pleasure to work with some of the best women enlisted in the work. Spoke of celebration of the Relief organization on March 17 and the good time enjoyed. Only one branch in stake with much grain stored as they have no way of taking care of it, but all have money for purchase when places are provided.

Mrs. Knowlton of Davis stake said that the work was much the same except perhaps that the officers meet in various places. The stake was reorganized three years ago, and the enrollment is now 830, with 28 societies and nearly 400 bushels of wheat stored. The general condition is good.

Miss Lottie Brain sang "Angels Serenade," and was followed by Mrs. Emma Empey, superintendent of the Relief Society nurses' class. She spoke of the announcement recently made that Dr. Margaret Roberts would again assume charge of the nurses' class. She said that there is a great need for nurses, and she hoped that there would be a large attendance at the next class. Said that these nurses do a great deal of good, for people need skilled help, and there is always a demand for it. Hoped that young girls would attend for even if they do not intend to make a profession of nursing, the training they get is invaluable in their own homes. The course is only six weeks, under other circumstances would cost them \$50. They make up in free nursing, in which work they get the needful experience and training for professional work. Hoped that many would respond.

Mrs. Phoebe Y. Beattie said that the nurses' class was a subject most dear to her heart. This work was one of the most important attempted by the Relief society, and its benefit could not be overestimated. She said that she hoped that for the classes yet to be taught the society would choose noble, virtuous and conscientious girls to take up this work. Wayward girls should not be sent, but those who have a right heart and are willing to do it, that her home was open to girls till they could be placed in good homes. Asked them to send good girls and many of them.

Mrs. Booth of the Boxelder stake said that she had labored with the stake over 40 years and was proud of the privilege. It takes about a week to visit with the associations. There are 20 of these and all are doing good work, although circumstances make it hard for them to attend meetings. All seem to have great joy in working for the cause. The stake has about 6,000 bushels of grain and 12 granaries, and members are interested in their cause—and are storing grain. Not much interest is taken there in the nurses' classes, but every effort is made to interest them. The meeting adjourned with singing and prayer.

This afternoon's session included an address by Counselor Annie T. Hyde, brief reports of stake presidents, a violin solo by Prof. W. C. Clive accompanied by Master Clifford Clive, an address by Alice Merrill Horne, a soprano solo by Mrs. Lizette Thomas Edward with violin obligato by Prof. Clive, and remarks by Mesdames Priscilla Emings, Elizabeth Wilcox and Minnie H. James, with the usual hymns interspersed. Credit is due Mrs. Lizette Thomas Edward and the accompanist, Miss Edna Corey for their excellent work. Mrs. Edwards is musical director of the society and always furnishes a notable good program.

Sessions will be held tomorrow in the same place.

## CONFERENCE TRAVEL.

Conference travel is beginning to be noticeable on lines leading into Salt Lake from outside points in the state and Idaho. While it is not expected any

records will be broken this year, heavy travel is anticipated. The Rio Grande brought in some few hundred more than 3,000 people last year and the Harriman line a corresponding number. This was a year ago this month. It is hardly thought that next year's figures will be reached this month.

Travel so far is from towns and cities

within the state. Strangers can be seen around the streets and hotels in constantly growing numbers but the real influx will not be until nearer the end of the week. Local offices of the various lines are awaiting for early figures so as to get some idea of what traffic may be expected. There is no end of equipment ready for use and splendid service can

be given because the roads are "swamped" with business as they have been in past years. It is believed every regular train service has a majority of cases will handle the crowds without trouble. 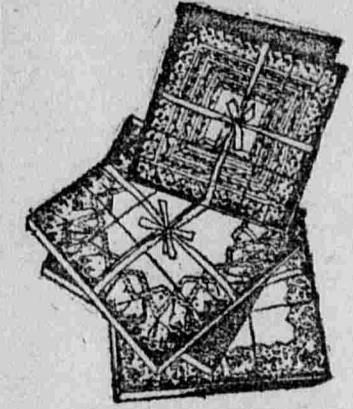
