Legislators Are Getting Down to Work These Days.

NUMBER OF BILLS PASSED.

Others Are Consigned to Their Last Resting Place -Osteopathy Bill

Discussed.

As the hours of the Legislature are drawing to a close the signs of activity are becoming more marked. The result of yesterday afternoon's session of the house was the passage of five bills and the decapitation of 10.

Those passed were Dr. Condon's bill

100, permitting physicians and surgeons from other states to practise here; Representative Hamlin's bill 20, providing for the eight-hour law in penal nstitutions; bill 146 by Representative Spry, raising salaries of justices of the supreme court to \$5,000, and bill 147, by Spry, raising the salaries of district judges to \$4,000. The fifth measure to become a law was Representative Anderson's bill 66, providing that all property shall be assessed and taxed a law aimed at tax dodgers, is a good measure and went through the house "kifing" by a vote of 30 to 11. The measures killed were Spry's 126, anti-treating bill; Haslam's 102, against

labor agencies using false pretenses; McFarland's 162, relating to places of trial in actions from other states; Richards' 168, providing for a state poard of accountants; Done's bill 161, against breaking locks on boats; Tiet-01, relating to marriage licenses Dr. Condon's state board of mmissioners; Mrs. Coulter's 41, pro viding mileage for judges; Colton's 89 and Johnson's 152, relating to notaries.
