## FOREIGN.

LONDON, 1.—A Vienna dispatch says, notwithstanding Prince Milan's departure for the front, immediate action seems to be deferred, as dispatches were sent on Thursday to the Servian agent at Constantinople containing important communications for the Porte. From this it would seem that Servia will, after all, try negotiation before appealing to arms. The above intelligence is confirmatory of previous reports that Servia had sent its ultimatum to Turkey.

Seven thousand Montenegrines will co-operate with the insurgents in Herzegovina.

A special hospital train, equipped by the Empress of Russia, has arrived in Montenegro. Russian sympathizers have also contributed six months provisions for the army and the people of Montenegro. Servia has received a loan of twelve million francs and donations amounting to 50,000 ducats.

Vaughan accepts the challenge of O'Leary for a twenty-four hours walking match, but declines the six days match, he never having had an opportunity to test his capabilities to that extent. He prefers to walk in England.

VIENNA, 1.—Prince Milan in his proclamation says, Turkey has provoked war by not satisfying Bosnia, and by threatening Servia. We enter Bosnia in the cause of humanity and nationality, and to re-establish peace without offending Turkey's integrity. The proclamation mentions Austria thankfully for her efforts to protect Christians.

BERLIN, 1.—The Prince of Montenegro has solemnly engaged to remain neutral in the Servian and Turkish troubles.

Count Von Arnim has arrived at Carlsbad. He is closely watched by Prussian detectives.

LONDON, 1.—In the case against Aspinwall and others, known as the Eupion Gas Company case, Aspinwall and Knecker were today sentenced to twelve and Muir and White to two months' imprisonment. Muir was the original projector of the Eupion Gas Company and Knecker manager of the Midland Bank, which advanced the money. White introduced these persons to Aspinwall, who managed the financing of the company. The indictment was for conspiracy to obtain, by false pretences, a settling day and quotation on the stock exchange. The case turned upon the question whether this was a criminal offense.

BELGRADE, 2.—The war manifesto of Prince Milan was promulgated on Saturday and a state of siege proclaimed throughout Servia. The manifesto says that the Prince, animated by ideas of moderation, offered to send an envoy to come to an understanding, but the Porte ignored the conciliatory offer and continued to send fresh troops. It is necessary to enter the insurgent country in order to pacify it, organize principles of justice and legality without distinction of religion and without failing to respect the integrity of the Ottoman Porte.

A proclamation will shortly be issued informing Bosnians of the approaching appointment of the new officials throughout the country in the name of Prince Milan.

PARIS, 2.—The Journal des Debats has a special telegram from Belgrade, which says that the council of war, recently held at Alexiantz, decided to open hostilities on the Fourth of July.

LONDON, 2.—A telegram from Paris states that the English, German and Austrian ambassadors yesterday informed the Porte that the three powers were resolved not to interfere.

A Constantinople special says that the Servians and Montenegrins entered the Turkish territory, and that a declaration of war had been duly lodged at Vienna.

The Times Cettinje special says that Montenegro sent to-day her declaration of war to the Turkish Government. The declaration contains a summary of her grievances against the Porte, and particularly the blockade of the southern frontiers, the Porte's evidently hostile intention towards Montenegro and the impossibility of reforms in Herzegovina. The people received the proclamation with great enthusiasm. The Prince started on Sunday morning for

Herzegovina by way of Garana. His guards accompanied him.

LONDON, 3.—The Times Paris dispatch reports flags distributed to the Montenegro troops after the mass on Sunday.

A telegram from Pesth says many of the inhabitants of Belgrade have fled into Hungary because the Turks threaten to bombard the city.

It is reported that the Servians have attacked the Turkish fort near Supovatz.

The Pall Mall Gazette to-day concludes a gloomy leader on the war as follows:—It is to be a war of race and religion. This is what they are trying to make of it in Russia; this is the argument in every proper forum, but we shall be glad if they will take it into consideration, since, if duly understood, it may do something to moderate the spirit which must gladden those who are as much foes of the English as of the Turkish empire.

BUCHAREST, 3.—Prince Charles, of Roumania, opened an extraordinary session of the chambers to-day. In his speech from the throne he says an imperial treaty guarantees the neutrality of Roumania. The Prince expresses hope that the external troubles will stop at the frontier as long as Roumania observes neutrality.

VIENNA, 3.—Official intelligence from Belgrade says the Servians, yesterday, crossed the frontier at three points. The places are not mentioned; but from the position of their forces, it may be presumed that the points are Alexinotz, Lesitz and some point on the Drena, simultaneously.

Dalmatia telegraphs that the Prince of Montenegro led his army into Herzegovina yesterday.

Servia has notified the powers that unless they declare the Danube neutral and prevent the Turks from using it for military operations, Servia will obstruct it with torpedoes.
