Nelson at once made plans for a return fight and declared he would prove to the world that he was Gans' master. After months of weary waiting they fought July 4th and Nelson completely knocked out Gans in the seventeenth round of a gruelling mill. Then the critics "hollered" again and said the fight was a fake, or that Gans was not in condition. After the fight Gans made the follow-ing statement: "I made one fight too many. Nelson is

Not until the count of 10 was finished did Gans, with his face terribly cut and with his yes glas-sy, attempt to rise.
