

## PARNELL CRUSHED.

The Result of the Election at Carlton  
Destroys his Last Hope.

WE SAY THAT HE IS NOT DISHEARTENED.

But Will Continue to be an Active Factor in Irish Politics.

BOSTON AT CARLTON.

It is a Disasterous Defeat For the Protectionists.

DUBLIN, July 8.—The result of the election at Carlton, which was a success in Parliament in the late O'Farrell constituency, resulted in a crushing defeat for the Protectionists candidate in the district which Parnell was to represent originally, but he said, if he had not been defeated he would not have been in politics for him to fall back upon.

Speaking at Carlton after the result of the election, Mr. Parnell said he was not disheartened and that he would continue to consolidate the independent men in every Irish county and city and put them to the field before the country for every election.
