LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

High Council.—All the members of the High Council are requested to meet at the Council House, on Wednesday evening the 10th inst., at 7 o'clock.

Holland.—A private letter from Elder B. H. Holland states that his health is now comparatively good. He is willing to do his duty, but feels it uphill work to get the Duties people to believe and obey the Gospel. He has baptised but one.

Central Committee.—The Central Committee of the Y. M. M. I. met last night at the Council House, Junior W. Wells presiding. A number of reports from different parts of the Territory were read. The resignation of B. F. Cummings as secretary and of Mathew W. Pratt as treasurer were accepted, and Orson F. Whitney was elected secretary and treasurer. The committee adjourned sine die.

Epidemic.—The epidemic whooping cough that has been so prevalent in this locality for some time has been unusually severe. We are informed by a prominent physician that the usual medical remedies have generally failed to effect satisfactory results. We are requested to ask through the News, for practical information with regard to the effects upon patients of removing them from one locality to another.

The Wales Saints.—On Tuesday evening the 5th, will be a concert at the 18th Ward Assembly Rooms, for the benefit of the emigrating fund to aid the poor Saints in Wales. The Union Glee Club and the 18th Ward choir have kindly consented to give their valuable assistance and a fine array of the local talent will take part in the performance. The entertainment will be under the direction of Prof. Thomas, and Mr. A. Parsons is the accompanist. The concert will double as a good one, the object is most commendable, and those considering a contribution should fill the house. Admission 25 and 50 cents.

Coal.—We are pleased to be able to correct an error that appeared in the News of yesterday, in an article on the Weber coal question. It was erroneously stated that an order had been received at Coalville, from the agent of the U. P. Company, to ship from there only two car loads a week. This was a mistake, which occurred from the figures 20 in the dispatch being taken for 200. Twenty car loads was the order.

In addition to this we learn from Mr. William Bateman, coal dealer, that the reason why Mr. Gould has not ordered more coal from the Weber mine for some time past, is that a considerable quantity of that article was on hand at the depot, the shed being full.

Creditable.—To-day we examined some specimens of Ingrain carpet, manufactured by A. W. Gray, of Piquette. The production is acknowledged by the best judges to be equal in quality to the same kind imported from the east. The materials used are all good, great care has been taken in weaving it, and the patterns and colors are unexceptionable. Brother Gray is not only able to compete with the east in point of quality but also with regard to price, the article is offered to be sold at \$2.00 per yard. He is a practical weaver, having worked at the business both in Glasgow and Philadelphia. He manufactured his own loom and supported the attachments and patterns from the last named city. If he receives the patronage he deserves, he will make a carpet manufacturing an important branch of industry in Utah. He is willing to work at a very moderate margin.

Leather Specimens.—We stated yesterday that samples of leather had been received at Z. O. M. I. from the tanneries of Smithfield, Neph, Springville, and Hunter & Morris of this city. In addition, specimens have since been obtained from Joseph, Pross and Payson. Hunter and Morris show some dried skins for linings that are not excelled east or west, and some very fine animal skins. According to the comparative facilities of the several tanneries a line could scarcely be drawn between the productions, which are good beyond expectation. In cowhide, in consequence of its advantages in machine work, it comes up a little ahead. Smithfield shows some commendable horse leather, and the calf grain of Pross is very fine. But there is not as much difference in the leather, except in the matter of size, as there is in the matter of price.

Theatre.—The Haverly minstrels drew another big house last night though not so large as on the previous evening. Their reception was immense. Every special place was secured. The dancing of Diamond, accompanying himself on the harp, is a pleasing novelty, and the "Burlesque Queen of Song" by Henry Rice is one of the funniest things ever presented in a performance of this character. To-night there will be a change in the cast, Messrs. Johnny Rice and Frank Cushman taking those places. The most enjoyable part of the entertainment to us is the singing of the California Quartette, who will give new selections this evening, when an entire change of programme will be presented. This is the last night of the engagement.

April 5th, 2 p. m.

After the usual opening exercises, Pres. Jos. E. Taylor stated that as the Saints would have an opportunity of voting for the General Authorities of the Church at the General Annual Conference, their names would now be omitted. A report of the building committee of the Tabernacle was read by the Secretary, Brother George, and a sum of money was received from all sources being \$17,904.41. They have paid out for material and labor \$16,504, leaving the committee in debt \$1,397.50.

Pres. ANGUS M. CANNON urged upon the Saints the desirability of completing the Tabernacle of this Stake before the coming winter sets in, and asked the Bishops and all associated in the government of the several Wards of this Stake to do their utmost to sustain the hands of the building committee. He referred to the efforts being made to emigrate the suffering Saints of Wales, and hoped all would feel interested in assisting in that work. Also in gathering the poor Saints of other countries. Where persons are called on missions they should cheerfully respond, and the families of those called should feel willing to have their husbands, fathers or brothers go and remain till released by the authorities that sent them.

Elder CHARLES C. RICH addressed the conference upon the necessity for union among the Saints. By it we can accomplish all that is required of us. We should strive to please the Lord and do his will independent of our own. If we do the will of the Lord, he will provide for and protect us.

President CANNON read the amounts of donations received from the various Wards of the Stake for the Tabernacle, the total being \$5,688.51.

Conference adjourned sine die. Benediction by Elder ORSON PRATT.

BY TELEGRAPH FOREIGN.

GERMANY.

The Federal Treaty, remains Berlin, &c. Intelligence from St. Petersburg indicates that the peace party is acquiring greater influence in the councils of the Czar. It is expected here that the Czar will solicit the good offices of the Emperor of Germany as a mediator between himself and England.

Russia Pushing Forward her Troops.

There seems to be some hope of a renewal of the congress negotiations, unless a collision is precipitated by the necessity for counteracting military measures. Russia is pushing forward on both sides of the Danube. The position at Constantinople is considered so doubtful, that very slight modifications of the situation might be considered to warrant an action which would amount to a breach of neutrality.

As long as Veldt Zscha remains Turkish prisoner, however, a Russo-Turkish alliance is believed out of the question. It is believed that the Roumanian cabinet's opposition to Russia is real and determined.

Sympathy for Russia.

The publication of the Gortschakoff-Gluka interview has aroused general sympathy for Roumanian throughout Europe. The Roumanian project against the Treaty of San Stefano was published in the Vienna *Battische Correspondenz*, yesterday, but it is not yet known to have been officially communicated to the powers.

Stock Market.

The stock market opens this morning, with indications of renewed confidence and with active speculation in console and Russian securities, at slightly higher prices.
