LUMBER TRADE. The lumber trade reports that the expected changes in conditions are quife acceptable, and prices in the wholesale market are firmer every week. In fact prices in the porthwest have advanced \$1 to \$4 per thousand on account of the demand. The rail-roads are coming back as purchas-ers and are buying largely, but quietly, so as not to attract attention and at-tract the market price. Cedar shingles are getting higher figures and it is im-possible to contract ahead without paying a premium on present prices Local conditions are maintaining

Local conditions are maintaining themselves well, with prospects of con-siderable building in the immediate fu-ture. Some dealers think the town has been built up to the demand; but men with money to invest do not hesitate to invest it in new buildings. Collections bananas to be got rid of. are good.

WHOLESALE DRY GOODS. The wholesale dry goods trade re-ports conditions for Thanksgiving week very fair along general lines seasonable at this time of year, such

as dress goods, outing flannels, wool flannels, horse blankets, quilts, etc. Jobbers say that retailers have allowed their stocks to run down to a point where replenishing is absolutely necesthen stocks to run down to a point where replenishing is absolutely neces-sary, and so orders are being received at a pretty lively rate. The general urade reports repeat orders on spring fabrics, with the full asking prices now being secured. Narrow models in skirts are said to be the feature, with the Empire satin gown the leader for extreme dress. Clinging fabrics are to be such to accentuate the draped effects. On garments for womea of moderate circumstances, department store buyers declare that they want the biggest values they can get this leading them to take suits, cloaks and jackets, that are not fully up to the standard of finish of the past seasons. In the models for fall and winter, the close fitting sleeve of full length is the one most common in all morning and af-

RETAIL DRY GOODS.

Shoes, rubbers and warm clothing are being called for in increasing quantities. STORM HURT MERCHANTS.

London Nation Opposed to Including U. S. in Two Power Standard. London, Nov. 27 .- The Nation today publishes a strongly-worded argument against including the United States in the two-power naval standard for Great Britain; in other words, that the British fleet should exceed the strength of any other two powers by 10 per cent. The paper says that America and Germany are the next two strongest naval powers after Great Britain. America, it explains, has practically to

build two navles, one for the Atlantic and one for the Pacific. "A people of 40,000,000," the Nation continues, "is called upon to provide a force stronger than that levied on 140,-000,000 of people. On this proposition we have two remarks to make: the first is, that the people of Great Britain cannot do it, and the second, that the libered peopter will yot two to do it.
