#### COUNTERFEITER CONFESSES. Put Under Pressure and Tells Police

Ogden, Jan. 12.—Curtis McCoy, who was arrested over a week ago with spurious coin in his possession, has, after continued "sweating," confessed to the making of the coins and will be tried by the federal authorities on the charge of counterfeiting. The task of breaking him down was not easy and to Capt. Brown, Detective Pender and Sergeant Chambers is due the credit of getting the confession from him, as the federal authorities had decided that a case could not be made against him and they were about to task, as they believed him guilty. After being carefully questioned, he made several admissions and then real-izing his position, told the officers that he had manufactured the spurious coin himself, and implicated a young man himself, and implicated a young man at Ashley, Idaho, as his accomplice. \$10,000 DAMAGE SUIT.
