HIGH SCHOOL CADET CORPS

Organization Practically Decided Upon by School Board.

Funeral of Charles Welch - Weber Stake Academy Notes - Pence Disbarred Reprimanded.

At the meeting of the board of education held last evening the proposition of organizing a cadet corps at the Ogden high school was practically decided upon. The matter has been under consideration for some time, and will no doubt be established in the very near future. The students are very enthusiastic over the proposition and already nearly one hundred have expressed their desire of joining the corps. The board appointed Messrs. Isalaub and Conroy as a committee to further investigate the advisability of the organization and to decide on the style of uniform, caps, etc., that shall be worn by the cadets; they will make their report to the board next Friday evening, when definite action will be taken on the proposition.

Superintendent Allison submitted his monthly report, which showed an enrollment of 4,034, with an average attendance of 3,536 during the past month. There were 222 cases of tardiness, and 1,973 pupils were neither tardy nor absent. The percentage of punctuality was 84.7 for the month. There were, during the month, one suspension for irregular attendance, and one for bad conduct, three cases of corporal punishment, and eight cases of truancy.

The funeral services over the remains of Charles Welch, the aged Pioneer who died Tuesday, will be held at the Ogden tabernacle Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The members of the High Priests' quorum, of which deceased was one of the presidency, are requested to attend the funeral in a body.


