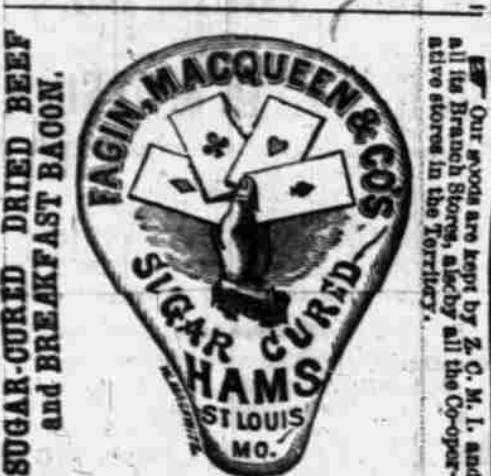

Died of his Wounds—Dead.

New York, 23.—McNamara, shot

by detectives last night, died to-

day.

Washington's birthday has been

quite generally observed through-

out the East and South.

Henry Smith, president of the

police board, died at the Metropolitan

Hotel to-night.

The Sturtevant Murder.

Boston, 23.—The coroner's jury,

to-day, at Bridgewater, after inves-

tigating the circumstances attending

the Halifax murder, returned a

verdict charging W. Everett Stur-

tevant, grand nephew of the mur-

dered man, with the act.

Celebration.

St. Louis, 23.—Some dozen soci-

eties of working men, headed by

the Lindell Grays and a volunteer

military company, marched down

the streets to-day in honor of Wash-

ington's birthday; otherwise the day

was observed by the closing of the

Merchant's Exchange and a partial

suspension of business.

Moving to the Front—Snow.

Chester, 23.—General Baker,

the noted Indian fighter, arrived

here yesterday, and left for the

front to-day. General Sheridan

and General Sherman, in com-

pany with the army, are in the

safety of this morning. Nine com-

panies of infantry and seven of

cavalry left here to-day for the vic-

inity of the Red Cloud Agency.

Considerable snow has fallen and

the weather is cold.

No Celebration—Temperance
