BOY PARALYZED BY A FALL

Fred Ball Falls from Trapeze Bar and is Seriously Hurt.

The shock paralyzed the boy from the neck down. He lay on his back, motionless, for several hours. He is entirely conscious of all that goes on and of his helplessness. Consolidation of Two Former Concerns—Licensed to Wed.

Logan, Cache Co., Sept. 25.—Articles of consolidation and incorporation of Hercules Electric Power company and the Logan Light, Heat and Power company, under the name of the Hercules Power company, were filed with the county clerk yesterday. The new company is capitalized at \$250,000, and is divided into 25,000 shares of \$10 each. The Hercules stockholders, which number 425 shares and the Logan company, which number 150 shares, which latter are deducted, however, to satisfy an overdraft of \$4,000 against the company.
