There was a full membership of the city council present at the session Tues-day night. A communication was read from the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company. It was in answer to a favor which Murray city asked of that company in regard to the free use of their poles on which to put 16 extra are lamps. The company stated that other cities of Utah have entered into contract with it providing for such use of their poles, by which they pay a small sum for the use of the same or leight argeing the follow with them or jointly creating the poles with them and using them together. Also that it would hardly be consistent for them to give Murray city the privilege of the free use of their poles when other cities pay for the same. But they are willing for the city of Murray to have this privilege providing they pay for the same as other citles do, which is 40 cents per year for the use of each pole. It is important to note that the Utah such use of its poles, by which they Independent Telephone company allows Murray city the free use of its poles without any fluestion, also when it free use of the city officials it readily agreed to install 14, where the Bell company complained at furnishing three.
