BASIN CITY, WYO. VICTIM OF FOUL FLAY.

Skelcton of Frank Blank Clears Up Mysterious Disappearance.

Basin, Wyo, April 2.—The mystery of the disappearance of Frank Blank of Red Lodge, Mont, at the Hunter ranch last September, has been dispelled by the discovery of Blank's skeleton in a thicket close to the camp he occupied at the time of his disappearance. The skeleton, picked clean by coyotes, was discover-ed by an employe at the Hunter ranch, identification being possible through fragments of clothing and jewelry. The finding of the skeleton proves conclusively that Blank was a victim of four play, and the sheriff at Red Lodge is expected to make arrests in connection with the case. Special Correspondence.

Two persons from Red Lodge accompanied him to the camp and left the next day. When nothing was seen of Blank for a week an investigation was begun, but no trace of him was ever found until this week. The sheriff at Red Lodge ar-rested the two persons who accomp-anied Blank to the camp, but later released them because there was not evidence of foul play in the case.
