He was baptized in his native State in March, 1839, by Elder William Hyde, moved to Nauvoo with his family in the fall of 1840, and remained there until the exedus of the Saints from that place, passing through the persecu-tions and afflictions incident to these years in the history of the church. In the year 1849 be emi-grated to the valleys, and settled in Salt Lake City. Remaining there for about a year, he moved to Pay-sen, and lived there till the Spring of 1860, when he moved to Logan City, Cache county, at which place he lived until the time of his death. Bro.
