Wins Annual Cross-Country Race of Six and One Hall Miles. Trinceton, N. J., Nov, 2s.-Cornell won the intercollegiate cross-country run to-day, deteating Pennsylvania, Yale, Har-vard, Columbia, Princeton and the Mass-sachusetts Institute of Technology. Pennsylvania was second, Massachusetts third, Yale fourth, Harvard fifth, Colum-bla sixth, and Princeton last. Out of 49 men who started, there being seven en-tries from each college, 46 Anished. The distance was six and a hair miles. Coyotani John Eisele of Princeton, who was a hot favorite for insividual honors in the race, became temporarily blinded after he had run four miles. Eisele was running well at the time but was unable to see and had to be led to the gymnasium. The trouble was due to paralysis of the muscles of the face, with which Eisele has been affected for Fennsylvania by 100 yards when he was forced out of the race.
