

BOUND OVER TO DISTRICT COURT

James Marsh Held by Judge Bowman for Assault on Mrs. Newell.

DAUGHTER AND SONS TESTIFY

Said Marsh Entered Their Home in Dead of Night and Strangled With Their Mother.

James Marsh was bound over to the district court for trial on the charge of assaulting Mrs. Malinda Newell with intent to murder her, Sept. 28, by Judge Bowman, in police court, this morning.

Ida Marie Newell, the 10-year-old daughter of the complaining witness, testified that she was sleeping with her mother in the front bed room, and that her 14-year-old brother, Dudley, was sleeping with Otto Simonds, 12 years of age, in a rear bedroom, at the Newell home, on the night of the alleged assault. She said that Marsh entered the room about 1 o'clock in the morning, awakening her mother, and that Marsh struck Mrs. Newell in the face with his fist, fell across her on the bed and choked her. The girl heard her mother groaning, and screamed to the boys to telephone to the police, she said. Marsh threatened to kill the girl if she should telephone to the police. She said Mrs. Newell had been ill.

Marsh, who is 16 years old, had talked to her he decided to suspend sentence in her case during good behavior.

GOT IN BAD COMPANY.

Warlock Amfto Pledges Not Guilty to Forging Check.

Amfto, 16 years of age, whose home is in Provo, pleaded not guilty to the charge of having obtained money by false pretenses from Morris Levy, a merchant, when arraigned in police court before Judge Bowman, this morning on complaint made to him by the Office of Detectives George streets. It is alleged that young Amfto passed a check from clearing house No. 6, ordering the Continental National bank to pay him \$5, and that the instrument carried the forged signature of L. P. Amfto.

The youth denies forging the check, though he admits having tried to pass it. He claims that he came here from Provo a short time ago, and that he got into trouble with the police. He states that a young man, by the name of Coleman forged the check and then persuaded him to pass it. His preliminary hearing was set for Dec. 14, and the bond placed at \$300.

THREE UNHAPPY WIVES.

Am Court to Sever Galling Matrimonial Bonds.

Mrs. Ella Peterson Williams seeks a divorce from her husband, Miles L. Williams and a division of their property in a complaint filed this morning in the Third district court. While this case is pending the asking for a month and a half has been made by the wife.

Williams, 31, a carpenter, says they were married on June 26, 1907. In July 1909, it is alleged, that Peterson drove his wife out of their home at 2355 Fifth East street and rented the place to private parties. He has obtained the money for the care of the children and failed to support her. On several occasions Mrs. Williams declares that he has locked her out of the house and beat her in a cruel manner.

Because her husband threatened to kill her with a butcher knife, Mrs. Sarah A. Leek declares she is afraid to live with him again and asks for a divorce. A complaint was filed this morning. They were married on June 4, 1906, and have one child, 19 months old.

Mrs. Mary E. Collins applied for a divorce this morning from George W. Collins charging him with cruelty. On one occasion, she alleges, he struck her in the face with a wooden board. They have two children and still ask for permanent alimony. They were married in Anaconda, Mont. on Dec. 31, 1882.

In the complaint Mrs. Muller declares that for the last ten years she has ministered to her mother, tended her and cared for her in every way. On account of her kindness toward her mother, Mrs. Muller says that Mrs. Brewster gave her the residue of her estate. It amounts to about \$2,500.

According to the complaint Mrs. Muller and her mother were joint proprietors of their combined efforts. When they were in California shortly before Mrs. Brewster died, Mrs. Muller says that she married and at that time her mother again told her that she had given the property to her.
