

BOUND OVER TO DISTRICT COURT

James Marsh Held by Judge Bowman for Assault on Mrs. Newell.

DAUGHTER AND SONS TESTIFY

Said Marsh Entered Their Home in Dead of Night and Struggled With Their Mother.

James Marsh was bound over to the district court for trial on the charge of assaulting Mrs. Malinda Newell with intent to murder her, Sept. 25, by Judge Bowman, in police court, this morning.

Ida Marie Newell, the 18-year-old daughter of the complaining witness, testified that she was sleeping with her mother in the front bedroom, and that her 14-year-old brother, Dudley, was sleeping with Otto Rimondis, 11 years of age, in a rear bedroom, at the Newell home, on the night of the alleged assault. She said that Marsh entered the room about 1 o'clock in the morning, awakening her mother, and that Marsh struck Mrs. Newell in the face with his fist, fell across her on the bed and choked her. The girl heard her mother groaning, and screamed to the boys to telephone to the police, she said. Marsh threatened to kill the girl if she should telephone to the police. She said Marsh then wrestled with Mrs. Newell all over the room, trying to throw her to the floor, and the two boys ran in, armed with a carpet stretcher, broom handle and pick handle, with which they beat Marsh, according to the girl. When Mrs. Newell tried to support herself by holding on to the furniture, Marsh grabbed her by the hair and jerked her head back and forth and kicked her, said little Ida. "You can call the police, but they can't get me, and I will come back and get you before morning," Marsh said, when he left the room, said the girl.

PURCHASED LAUDANUM.
On cross examination, Ida testified that her mother had purchased laudanum from Meyer's drug store once or twice previous to the trouble with Marsh. She said that her mother had told her that she had thrown a bottle of laudanum out of the window once when she caught Marsh trying to commit suicide by drinking the poison. Ida Newell denied that her mother had ever threatened to or had ever attempted to commit suicide.

TESTIMONY OF BOYS.
Dudley Newell and Otto Rimondis gave similar testimony to the effect that on the day before the alleged assault, Marsh had told Mrs. Newell that if she would not sleep with him, he would go to a graveyard and commit suicide. The boys said that Mrs. Newell had sent them out of the house, with instructions to follow Marsh to the cemetery and to watch him and see if he should attempt to kill himself.

MARSH MADE THREATS.
Patrolman Woods testified that a call had been received at the police station from the Newell home, and that when the officers went there they searched the place and found Marsh asleep in the cellar, and that two girls took an automobile ride to Ogden last Thursday and returned Friday. The parents of the young girls have returned the matter to the juvenile court and it is also being investigated.

CASES IN JUVENILE COURT.
Criminal Charge May be Entered Against Four Young Men.

Judge Alexander McMaster of the juvenile court acted on a number of cases Tuesday which have been under investigation for some time. Three girls, who are under age, and eight boys, four of whom are over age, were before the court and it is probable that the young men will be arrested on a criminal charge. They were brought to a wagon to steal watermelons and incidentally took along a keg of beer, a quart of gin, a quart of whiskey and a bottle of blackberry brandy. Three of the girls and two of the boys were taken to Ogden last Thursday and returned Friday. The parents of the young girls have returned the matter to the juvenile court and it is also being investigated.

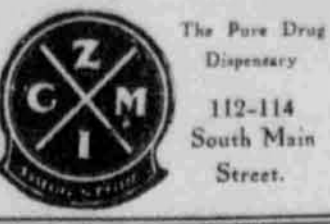

It is alleged that young Autoft passed a check from clearing house No. 6, ordering the Continental National bank to pay him \$5, and that the instrument carried the forged signature of L. E. Autoft.

THREE UNHAPPY WIVES.

Ask Court to Sever Gallant Matrimonial Bonds.

Mrs. Ella Peterson Williams seeks a divorce from her husband, Miles L. Williams, and a division of their property in a complaint filed this morning in the Third district court. While the case is pending she asks for \$20 a month as temporary alimony. They were married on June 25, 1907. In July 1908, it is alleged, that Peterson drove his wife out of their home at 235 Fifth East street, and rented the place to private parties. He has obtained the money for the rent of the place and failed to support her. On several occasions Mrs. Williams declares that he had looked her out of the house and treated her in a cruel manner. Because her husband threatened to kill her with a butcher knife, Mrs. Sarah A. Leck declares she is afraid to live with him again and asks for a divorce in a complaint filed this morning. They were married on June 4, 1906, and have one child, 10 months old.

GOES TO JURY TODAY.

Arguments in Kothiaffs Murder Case Concluded Before Judge Lewis.

The arguments in the case of John Kothiaffs, charged with the murder of Peter Gies, were completed in Judge Lewis' court at noon. Judge Lewis will instruct the jury this afternoon and the case will be delivered into its hands.

WOULD BE ADMINISTRATOR.

Mrs. Muller Says She Is Entitled to Residue of Mother's Estate.

Mrs. Violet Muller petitioned the Third district court this morning to discharge Charles K. Muller as administrator of the estate of her mother, Mrs. Ruth Brewster, who died about two years ago, and appoint her as administrator. In the complaint Mrs. Muller declares that for the last ten years of her mother's life that she attended her and cared for her in every way. On account of her kindness toward her mother, Mrs. Muller says that Mrs. Brewster gave her the residue of her estate. It amounts to about \$5,000. According to the complaint Mrs. Muller and her mother bought the property by their combined efforts. When they were in California shortly before Mrs. Brewster died, Mrs. Muller says that she married and at that time her mother again told her that she had given the property to her.

COUNTY TREASURER UPHELD.

After making every preparation to file suit against the county to recover \$7,150.55 which was deducted by County Treasurer J. A. Grosbeck as the cost of collecting the taxes a year ago, the city has decided that the county had a right to charge this amount. City Atty. Harper J. Dimmy discovered the law in the matter while preparing his case and sent an opinion Tuesday to the council to this effect.

LUMBER FIRM SUE.

The Tague Mahogany company of Indiana filed suit against the Utah Building & Manufacturing company to recover \$13,425 alleged to be due on lumber sold to the defendant on June 1, 1909.

FATHER BRINGS SUIT.

Ollo Kappela, a tailor, filed suit Tuesday against the Bingham Livery and Transfer company to recover damages in the sum of \$10,000 for the death of his son, Robert, who was run over and killed by a wagon belonging to the livery company on Nov. 11, 1907. In the complaint, it is alleged the company had a contract with the school board to haul the pupils to the Central school from Lead Hill. The driver was not of sound mind. It is alleged, and was incompetent to be trusted with the children. Young Kappela was hanging on the back of the wagon when the driver whipped up the horses and he was thrown under the wheels and died two days later from his injuries.

BRIDE CHARGES CRUELTY.

Mrs. Lila Sparks filed suit for divorce against Henry Sparks Tuesday afternoon in the Third district court, charging him with cruelty. They were married on Jan. 1, 1906, and have one child. Mrs. Sparks asks for the custody of the child and suitable alimony. In the complaint, it is alleged that Sparks assaulted his wife in the street and threatened to knock her down. He also called her vile names last August and drove her out of their house in Garfield.

SEEKS DIVISION OF PROPERTY.

Jack Stringfellow has filed an action, as administratrix of the estate of Samuel Stringfellow, deceased, against George Stringfellow and the Salt Lake Security & Trust company, seeking a

division of the property at one time owned jointly by Samuel Stringfellow and George Stringfellow, his brother. The property concerned in the action, which is friendly in its nature, includes the property known as 120 Main street and other property in this city. Through an error, a previous account of this action stated that an action seeking the appointment of another administratrix in the estate had been filed, but the facts in this instance are as above stated.

CHANCE FOR ENTOMOLOGIST.

The United States civil service commission will hold an examination on Dec. 15 for an entomologist for the bureau of science at Manila in the Philippines. The salary going with it is \$1,600, but there is a chance for advancement. The person wanted must have a thorough knowledge of entomological training, together with a desire for research work. The nearest place for applications to be made from this city is to the secretary of the board of examination at Denver.

CONFISCATES NEAR BUTTER.

Tuesday afternoon State Dairy and Food Commissioner Hansen confiscated several samples of the near butter product and warned the restaurant men that, if they serve it for butter, they must notify the customer just what the stuff is. Some of the restaurant men say they cannot afford to serve better because of the extremely high prices, and have to resort to oleo.

The Chinese who make their habitat in the state of Utah are having their annual migration to the celestial kingdom. It has evidently been a good year, financially, for them, for hundreds are on their way or preparing to go, to the flowery kingdom, there to take part in the celebration of the Chinese New Year, which this time starts on Feb. 8.

The date of the Chinese new year is on each occasion. And it varies from that of America in that it extends for a week or 10 days. It is the one great fest time of the year among the followers of Confucius and the return

to China by those who live abroad is very much the same as a pilgrimage to Mecca among the Mohammedans.

The bureau of immigration, which is compelled to pass upon all of the globe trotters, has records already to show that this year's host is to be a record breaker.

The exodus is not alone from Salt Lake but very general throughout the intermountain country.
