PIONEER MONUMENT SHAFT.

This above is an exact chalk plate reproduction of a photograph of the big rock, heavy from the Livingston quarry in Little Cottonwood canyon for the Pioneer Monument shaft. As shown, the rock was being moved on rollers by human strength in a wagon over by. A vast amount of labor and considerable ingenuity were expended in getting the rock from the mountain and getting it ready for shipment in this city. A large force of men have been steadily employed in the undertaking for several weeks and today they succeeded in loading it on a specially provided wagon on which it will be conveyed a distance of one mile from the quarry to the Granite Western where it will be transported to this city. When it is understood that its present weight exceeds twenty tons and that it is so heavy that it cannot be moved by hand, it is not surprising that the people of this city will again be proud to have been instrumental in the achievement of this feat. It is estimated that it will require fifteen pairs of horses to draw it from the quarry to the Monument site.
