

GENEALOGY.

James H. Martineau Gives Interesting Data of His Forebears, Descendants of the Huguenots of France—St. George Temple Work.

No publication in the Deseret News of genealogical and temple work has already been productive of much good, several known to the writer having thus received valuable information relative to their kindred living or dead, and to their work done among the dead, and I have seen some names of deceased for several thousand names, and in my record those of many now living in the Church connected by intermarriage. It may be that some of them a work has also been performed by others. To avoid such possible chance for error in time to come, I give a sketch of my family connections with the dead.

So far as I know, I am the only Martineau ever baptized into the Church from the outside world; if there be others I would like to know and correspond with them, as thus missing genealogical links may be supplied by parties.

My father, John Martineau, born March 27, 1818, died April 1, 1886, born March 22, 1831, son of Stephen and Marguerite Barbesson of Dieppe, France. They were Huguenots, and by the revocation of the edict of Nantes in 1682 became victims of a persecution so deadly that multitudes all who could fled to Switzerland, Holland, Germany, England and America for refuge. Back in 1840 he noted above, escaped with his family to England and became head of the English branch of Martineaux. I here remark that many years ago my son, Lyman H. Martineau, when in London, met and obtained from Mr. Basil Martineau, an eminent barrister, a complete record of the family and connections back to 1616.
