On the corners of the table supporting this were drums, hatchets and small flags, and on the backs of the chairs in which sat the ladies who dispensed the refreshment, were flags with brass spears tied with a blue and gold cord and tassels.

On the panels between the windows were crossed swords surmounted with shields, and draperies in red, white and blue were brought from the corner windows and fastened with a shield and bugle over crossed swords.

In the diningroom downstairs the same decorations and artistic design prevailed, the table being especially pretty. In the center stood a group of silk flags tied with heavy cord and tassels in gold and blue, surmounted by a gold eagle, and on two corners of the table were candelabra shaded in red, while the opposite corners held drums and hatchets. Completing the effective decorations were two wreaths of cherries and ferns arranged in semi-circles. Throughout the large hall oriental rugs and divans made attractive cozy corners, and in the reception hall Christensen's orchestra, screened by a bank of palms, rendered a program of patriotic airs during the afternoon.
