Only Bank Receives
Stiff Sentence.

James McNeerney was sentenced to serve 20 years in the state prison to serve by Judge George G. Armstrong in the criminal court of the Third district. This is the culmination of the daring robbery in April last when the Onyx Bank saloon was entered by McNeerney and two companions, all with drawn revolvers. The robbers rifled the pockets of James Neelham, proprietor of the saloon, and Jim Mahy, a friend of McNeerney's, who was in the place on the night of the robbery.

The entire transaction took place within three minutes. The robbery occurred about 8:30 in the evening, a time when the streets were brilliantly lighted and thronged with people. A curious circumstance is the fact that within a minute of the robbery, in an adjoining place of business, at the time of the robbery two city detectives were talking with friends and they were passing the police officers, who were talking at the point where their "beats" came together. So quietly was the robbery conducted.

Some of the police officers, or in fact persons passing the saloon at the time, knew of it. Five minutes later the saloon was thronged with the detectives, dealers in stolen goods and citizens, and the news of the robbery spread when the alarm was sounded.
