Question That Arises Over Death of the Man Killed at the Return Saloon-Is Thomas Kane or George Kled Responsible? - Both Men Under Arrest-Victim's Body at The Morgue Where Autopsy Will be Held.

C. A. Westman, the aged stonemason who was assaulted in the Return sa-leon, 28 east First South, yesterday afternoon, died at the Holy Cross hos-declares that Kane did not hit westman, but that Kied struck the blow and then ran rapidly down the street. Attorney James F. Smith also declares that Kane did not hit the old who was assaulted in the Return saloon, 28 east First South, yesterday afternoon, died at the Holy Cross hospltal as a result of his injuries. As De. Benedict stated when called to attend to Westman, he sustained a fracture at the base of the brain, but it was not excected he would die so soon.

There are conflicting stories with reference to who knocked him to the pavement, and several supposed "eyeises" declare that Thomas Kane struck the fatal blow, while others insist that the porter, George Kled, as saulted him. HARD TO IDENTIFY DEAD.

The dead, many of them so terribly nangled that identification seemed well nich impossible, were laid on the ground and a short distance from the scene, By 6 o'clock a corps of twelve physicians was operating on the injured and dressing their wounds in the temporary hos-pital. Four of the injured died at the hospital before 8:30 o'clock. When the wrecking train crew had finished pulling to pieces the tangled and broken cars, seventeen dead men were lying on the grass awaiting removal to the mor gue. A majority of them were killed while asleep. The circus performers were on the rear of the moving train and escaped injury.
