I will say that this case shows the necessity of having some place of de-tention for girls other than the city and county jail for as our custom is to spend some days in investigation all cases of boys by reason of our Morris school where we can detain boys who defy the authority of the court, but in the case of girls we have no place where they can be put in a normal condition and where our lady proba-tion officer can befriend them and give them the saving benefit of our probation system.
