

ter. The statements made to Mrs. Young, the probation officer, were so positive and the mother's story substantiated them, that the complaint was made against the girl with being a delinquent, the charge being that she was incorrigible and beyond the control of her parents.

DIDN'T EXPECT EXPOSURE.

The facts stated above were not known to me prior to the examination of the girl, which occurred after all other cases had been disposed of, a recess ordered and all persons not witnesses or interested in the case, requested to leave the court room, as it was not our custom to hear cases of this kind in open court. Three reporters remained in the court room, and owing to the fact that these reporters and the papers that they represented have been so kind and considerate of the children who have come before me, even to the suppression of names, and not imagining for one moment that this case would develop in such an unexpected manner, I did not ask them to retire. The probation and police officers made the statement outlined above. The girl was called to the stand, and I proceeded in my usual way to conduct this case and questioned the girl relative to her conduct with this man with whom she was staying. She became immediately defiant, ignored the questions of the court, upbraided her mother and charged her with cruelty and other offenses, using unseemly language, stating that she was a lady and that the officers, relatives and, in fact, everyone, was lying about her, that she would obey no orders of the court, no commands of her mother, would go nowhere that she did not want to go, would answer no questions that she did not want to answer, and would listen to no one who talked to her. Notwithstanding that she ran away from home with this man and was staying with him, she insisted with such vehemence as to her chastity that I was forced, having no other alternative, to inform the girl that if she would not assist the court in establishing her innocence in the face of all the damaging testimony, there was but one way for the court to ascertain the real facts, and that was to have the court physician make an examination of her mother was agreeable.

IS THIS THE TRUTH?

The mother being agreeable to this arrangement, the court was adjourned to give the mother and the girl an opportunity to visit the physician's office and they went out in charge of Probation Officer Clark, accompanied by the police officer, who volunteered to go with them, as he had some previous knowledge of the girl's character. The mother and the girl, upon their return to the court room, giving no evidence that she would offer any resistance, and the only display on her as noticed by me was as she sat down, she turned to the officer placed his hand on her arm and she jerked away, saying, "Don't you dare touch me." As to what transpired after she left the court room, I do not wish to look out of the window, I saw her standing on the lawn in an attitude of defiance. Being opposed to any violence whatever, and not wishing the officer to do anything, I immediately sent a clerk on the run out of the courtroom to tell them not to humiliate the girl by taking her through the streets, and to order a carriage, which was done, and the girl and the mother were taken to Dr. Beatty's office, where she talked in the same defiant manner as she had in the courtroom. This was continued until not by phone by Dr. Beatty, who in a kind way tried to convince the girl that it was for her own good. The mother also requested the doctor to examine the girl and pleaded with the girl to submit, which she refused to do. The girl and her mother then returned to my chambers, where the girl told Mrs. Young that her sister abused her, and that she was perfectly willing to submit to an examination under conditions that she thought would be beneficial.

DISPUTES WITNESSES' TESTIMONY.

Mrs. Young accompanied the girl to the Deaconess home, where, after preparing herself, she willingly, if not anxiously, let Dr. Beatty make the examination, and she was not objecting to the examination to prove her innocence had it not been for the following facts, viz: that her mother lied about her, that her sister abused her, and that her clothing had been known to have been with him on previous occasions. Furthermore I would state that it would be impossible for me or anyone else to have used the girl or her mother in any way, or to have put any questions in a more delicate manner in a case where a girl of 16 was caught in a bed room with a man of 42, having fled away from home with him, and who are known to have been with him on previous occasions. I will say that this case shows the necessity of having some place of detention for girls other than the city and county jail for as our custom is to spend some days in investigation all cases of boys by reason of our Morris school where they have been known to defy the authority of the court, but in the case of girls we have no place where they can be put in a normal condition and where our lady probation officer can befriend them and give them the saving benefit of our probation system.

RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED.

The investigation I recently concluded although the commission will meet in the morning and further consider the matter and may examine other witnesses.

ament and inviting the members to come forward and sign the path. A recess was then taken.

The opening of the lower house of parliament was preceded by a religious service of thanksgiving in the great auditorium in front of the hall.

Prof. Mouromtseff, the candidate of the Constitutional Democrats, was elected president of the lower house.

Ambassador Meyer was accorded a rousing reception from the crowd in front of the Tauride garden. As he drove up there was tremendous cheering from the representatives of free America. The people wanted to take out the horses and draw the ambassador's carriage with their hands, but this he would not permit. He alighted without assistance and walked in the midst of cheering thousands to the gates.

So far as known the only disorder reported occurred near the Winter palace, between an officer and a party of roughs, who struck the officer in the face, whereupon the latter drew his sword and cut down his assailant. The officer was arrested. The man is not mortally wounded.

AWAITING NEXT SPEECH.

Odessa, May 10.—The text of the speech from the throne at the opening of the first Russian parliament is being awaited with intense interest here, and the news from the southern provinces furnish evidence of the eagerness with which the population is looking forward to the message of the emperor. The town council of Odessa, the zemstvo, the board of commerce and the university, all telegraphed their greetings to parliament, and to the Odessa representatives and expressed the hope that parliament will courageously accept the challenge of the government in the promulgation of the autocratic fundamental law.
