Applied For Water—Engineers Wil-lard Young and Frank C, Kelsey filed application yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer, for 60,000 acre feet from the Weber river and Beaver creek where a storage dam is to be built just above their junction. In connection with this there will be a canal 189,000 feet long, and 15,000 feet flume. The canal is to be 33 feet wide, and 6½ feet deep. A second application asks for 25,000 second feet of water from Chalk creek near Coalville, for irrigation of 200,000 acres; and a third application asks for 12,000 acre feet from the Smith and Morehouse fork of the Weber river, from a storage dam at that point, to irrigate 5,220 acres. This scheme covers irrigation projects in Summit and Morgan counties, and the applicants represent large irrigation applicants represent large irrigation nterests.

Condition of Various Funds of City up to Thirtieth of September.

OVERDRAFT IS \$244.022.69.

Of Deficit \$150,943.96 is in Contingent Fund-At Beginning "Americans" Had Balance of \$3,803.49.

In response to a request of Councilman Wells, a report was submitted to the city council last night by City Auditor Alff showing the condition of the various funds of the city for the nine months of this year ending Sept. 30, 1906. The figures submitted show very forcibly the extravagance of the great "American" administration as the total overdraft in the general

the total overdraft in the general funds of the city amounts to \$244.-022.69. Of this deficit \$150.943.96 is in the general contingent fund, which at the beginning of this administration had a balance on had of \$3,803.49. The streets fund shows a deficit of \$55.653.93 as compared to a balance on hand on Jan 1, 1906, of \$59.927.06. The water supply fund shows a de-ficit of \$30,235.17. The waterworks, sewer and library funds show a to-tal balance on hand of only \$12.-\$10.37 in all. The total receipts of the general fund for the nine months were \$265.792.36 while the disburse-ments for the same period amounted ments for the same period amounted to \$683,071.53.

OTHER FUNDS OVERDRAWN.

Three of the special funds are also overdrawn. The street paving fund shows a deficit of \$10,601.82; the water main extension fund is over-drawn \$546.49; and the curbing and guttering fund is overdrawn \$202.95, making a total deficit in the special funds of \$11,351.36. With the grand total balance in all funds left over from last administration amounting to \$887,941.34 the "American" admin-istration at the end of nine months in power only has a total balance in all funds of \$291,156.98, while the de-ficit in the general funds amounts to \$244,022.69. The report of the audi-tor did not create any comment from the "American" side of the council but it was quietly referred to the finance committee upon motion of Councilman Walls. Three of the special funds are also finance committee upon motion of Councilman Wells.
