ADMITTED HIS GUILT.

Fred McGuire Confesses to Robbing Wells, Fargo & Co.

San Louis Obispo, Cal., Feb. 11.—The trial of Fred A. McGuire, who several weeks ago threw a Wells, Fargo & Co. express safe from a Southern Pacific train and stole its contents, was brought to a sudden close today. The prisoner, who heretofore had refused to give his name, admitted his identity and guilt and was immediately sentenced to 15 years' imprisonment in the state prison at Folsom.

A few days ago McGuire confided to J. W. Reardon, a jail trusty, the hiding place of his booty. The trusty was seen digging in a secluded spot and when caught, he was taken to the sheriff's office. The cache was uncovered and found to contain \$748.53 and diamonds valued at several hundred dollars. Reardon also said that McGuire and he had planned to escape by throwing the express in the eyes of Sheriff Ives. The pepper was found in one of McGuire's pockets. When confronted with the new evidence against him McGuire broke down and confessed.

McGuire, in telling the story of his life said tonight that he formerly conducted a flour mill at Escalante, Utah.

MORE FIRE PROTECTION.

Alterations Agreed Upon at Grand and Other Theaters.

Following up their inspection of the Salt Lake theater, the councilman committee visited the Grand, Bon Ton, Novelty and Unique theaters yesterday afternoon to ascertain what protection each had against fire.

In the Grand's case, practically the same alterations were agreed upon as at the Salt Lake, including the asbestos curtain, new fire escapes, a new gallery exit, more adequate water connections on the stage and the fireproofing of the exits between the stage and the auditorium.

The Bon Ton theater's exits are not wide enough and will be remodeled. The objection at the Novelty was the steep steps inside. These will be eliminated by putting in an incline.

The Unique theater, the councilmen decided, has ample exits and fire protection.

The committee of inspection includes Councilmen Hartenstein, Peniston, J. Davis, Hobday, Dean, E. H. Davis and Tuddenham, with Fire Chief Devine associated.

BUSINESS METHODS.

Senator Bamberger's Topic Before Students of L. D. S. University.

Hon. Simon Bamberger of the Commercial club made a very interesting and happy address before the students of Salt Lake and L. D. S. business colleges yesterday at 3:30 p. m. The senator's remarks were full of feeling and produced a marked impression on the minds of the assembled students.

The program of beautiful music, the singing and the piano solo "Recollections of Home" had carried his mind back to the distant land of Germany and to the little village in which he was born. The young people now before him were truly to be envied for their school life, from every indication, must be pleasant, indeed.
