A CARRIAGE OF A KING.

Beautiful Stage Coach Exhibited at the World's Fair.

St. Louis .- In the Bengulat museum at the world's fair there stands out, amid the priceless treasures of the most perfect art-handleraft of all ages and lands, a brilliant bouquet of color that irresistibly draws the eye.

On investigation it proves to be the state coach of the king of Portugal, all in red and gold, with decorations of the period and style of Louis Quinze. There are four LEGAL BLANKS, a full supply, all the latest forms at the Deserct News wheels, the rear ones, which are much the largest, being about four feet nine

the largest, being about four feet nine inches in diameter.

The tires are studded with heavy knobheaded nails, which have been the subject of heated discussion. One theory is that they were put there, by the king's orders, by way or penance, to give at least i touch of firegularity to the motion of the vehicle; while others hold that they are merely evidences of the carriage-maker's lack of skill, or of the backward condition of his art, the thres being nailed throughout, instead of welded to the wood. According to another hypothesis they were intended to prevent the vehicle from slipping when on a steep grade, and are therefore to be looked upon as up-to-date centrivances similar in principle to those found on the wheels of agricultural ergines.

The body of the cach is panelled in vernis martin, with paintings of classical subjects—nymphs and loves and beatiful wemen in extreme dishabile. It is lined with Genoese brocade velvet fringed with gold, and is swung, like George Washington's coach, on immense strips of extremely thick leather, which take place of springs very satisfactorily.

One's imagination is thrilled by the thought of the splendors and galeties in which this court equipage played a part during the heyday of the eighteenth cen-
