LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

MEETINGS at the Tabernacle to-morrow at eleven and two o'clock, and in the evening at the various Ward meeting-houses.

PREFESSOR McDONALD.—This gentleman will deliver another of his popular lectures at the Tabernacle to-morrow night. Admission fifteen cents.

He proposes delivering his last lecture in this city, tomorrow night. Admission free.

THEATRE.—There is a very attractive bill for the Theatre this evening. The first thing on the programme is the fine domestic drama of Mary Price, or the Adventures of a Servant Girl, in which Miss E. Condit will play the title-role, Miss Rose Evans Tommy the Idiot, Miss Adams Mother Love.

Next comes a ballet by Mr. W. L. Isaac, then a song and dance by Mr. Harry Lorrain.

The concluding play is the favorite one of the Theatre, the Regiment, Miss Rose Evans as Josephine, Miss E. Condit as the Marchioness, Mr. Blum as Sergeant Scallie, Mr. Graham as Guillot, Mr. Bowring as Pandemicke.

This is the last appearance of Miss Rose Evans, which is an interesting programme, will doubtless prove a sufficient inducement to the theatre-going public to fill the house, which the bill will deserve.

A PARTY.—There was a pleasant party in the Twentieth Ward School House last night.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PARTY.—There was a very large attendance at a party of the teachers and scholars of the Thirtieth Ward Sabbath school, yesterday afternoon and evening, in the Academy rooms. It was a pleasant affair, and included dancing, music on the concertina, by Master Elv, singing by the scholars, and by Superintendent George Goddard, and some excellent remarks by President D. H. Wells.

THE BAKER CASE.—Although we published yesterday the reason given by Judge McKean for his refusal to issue a warrant for the arrest of Charles W. Baker, on a charge of perjury, in connection with the Dr. Robinson murder case, we give the matter in detail as follows:

"Third District Court, the People, etc., vs. Charles W. Baker, in Chambers, at Salt Lake City, Jan. 26, 1872.

"This is an application made on an affidavit by one Leverett Bann for a warrant against Baker on a charge of perjury.

"Z. Snow for the complainant.

"McKean, C. J.—On the 14th day of December, 1871, James Toms, Alexander Burt and John L. Blythe were brought before the Judge of this court, sitting as an examining magistrate, charged with having, together with others, murdered Dr. J. King Robinson, in this city, on the night of October 22, 1866. They were granted an immediate examination, and thereupon the said Charles W. Baker was sworn as an affidavit witness on the part of the people, and gave material and important testimony.

"The said Charles W. Baker, now before the Judge of this court, makes an affidavit charging Baker with having committed perjury in his testimony. The affidavit alleges that Baker's testimony and conduct thus:

"This affiant further says that he firmly believes that he, the said Charles W. Baker, for reason of the testimony so given by him, given, did knowingly, willfully and corruptly commit the crime of perjury.

"On the 9th day of January, 1872, grand jury of this, the Third District Court, convened in adjournment session in this city, and at noon to-day (January 20), they were adjourned for one month. I am officially informed, that this charge against Baker, and testimony bearing thereon, were submitted to the grand jury, who failed to find an indictment on the matter.

"The application for a warrant is refused."

This subject is one of grave importance, seeing that in it the lives and liberties of several men are at stake, and the public are doubtless anxious to be informed whether the official information imparted to Judge McKean included anything else besides that the grand jury "failed to find an indictment" against Baker. As we are a distant reader, we are sorry to state that yesterday, there is a report, current to the effect that the grand jury not only failed to find an indictment against Baker, but on the charge preferred against him, but that they refused to entertain the charge, although it is stated that Baker's testimony was given in the presence of the grand jury, and that the grand jury refused to send for or hear witnesses, prepared to give evidence substantiative of the charge against Baker.

It is unnecessary to comment to any extent on this affair, which to the uninitiated public may be made to appear to be a muddled up concern, and shows a degree of corruption in some quarters that is really deplorable.

Should this matter receive the scrutinizing investigation that it ought to have, so that all the pertinent facts connected therewith may be made to the public, and a discriminating public will be able to form a correct opinion, with regard to it. As it is, however, powerful opinions are being constantly expressed, which opinions are not very complimentary to some parties who are understood to have had a hand in the business.

AN ACCIDENT.—As Mr. Sears was driving past the Eagle Gate this afternoon, his buggy broke down and he escaped, throwing Mr. and Mrs. Sears and their little girl out. Mr. S. and the child were considerably bruised; we understand, however, that their injuries are not dangerous. Mr. Sears was unhurt.

THE TERRITORIAL LEGISLATURE.

Friday, Jan. 26.

COUNCIL.—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

Councilor Cannon, from Committee of conference, reported back "An Act pertaining to Licenses," intended as the action of the Joint Committee. Ordered printed.

Councilor Jesse N. Smith, from Special Committee, reported back (C. F. No. 9), "An act providing for the solemnization of marriage," with amendments, and recommended the bill to pass. Referred.

Councilor Cannon presented chapter 3, title 1, to chapter 1, title 2, of (C. F. No. 6), "An Act to prescribe the manner of conducting criminal proceedings." Referred.

"An Act further defining the duties of superintending of the Salt Lake and Wasatch wagon roads, and repealing certain acts relating thereto," was referred.

On motion of Councilor Smoot, the Council adjourned till Monday at 10 a.m.

HOUSE.—Mr. Pace presented petition of M. Tanner and 243 others, citizens of Utah County, praying for a general free school system, and asking the assembly to memorialize Congress to aid in the establishment of common schools; read and referred.

Mr. Rockwood, in behalf of committee on roads, etc., to whom was referred the report of the Superintendent of the Salt Lake City and Wasatch wagon road, reported a concise financial exhibit for 1870 and 1871, showing that in 1871 there was a deficit of \$107,935 was collected, the sum of \$300,000 was all that was expended directly on the road, the Superintendent claiming \$300,000 and the toll keepers \$200,000. Said committee thereupon reported a bill which in effect repeals the charter.

"An Act providing for the solemnization of marriage," was read and referred.

Messrs. Peacock and J. W. Young were appointed a committee to wait on the Executive, the Governor, in relation to the bill providing for the election of delegates to a Convention.

Adjourned till Saturday at 10 a.m.

HOUSE.—The committee on roads reported back petition of E. D. Woolley and

others, for estray pound law and further regulation of poll tax, stating that further legislation was necessary pertaining to the poll tax, and that the estray pound subject was being attended to.

The chairman of committee on agriculture, trade and manufactures reported a substitute bill entitled "An act authorizing the creation of county jails and defining the duties of the officers thereof," which was read, and passed.

The governor sent a message voting the act for holding a convention for forming a State Constitution.

On motion of Mr. Young, Messrs. Taylor, Rockwood, and J. W. Young, were appointed a committee on the part of the House, and the Council were requested to appoint a like committee to act in conjunction, to prepare a joint resolution submitting to the people whether or no they would vote for holding a convention to draft a constitution and elect delegates to present the same to Congress, and ask for admission into the Union as a sovereign State.

On motion of Mr. Taylor the same committee was appointed to express the sense of the House in relation to the offensive matter in the governor's message.

House adjourned till Monday at one p. m.
