Heavy Shipments of Utah Potatoes to California.

BABY PLAYED WITH MATCHES.

Bulls Against the Southern Pacific—Palouse Fired for Brinkmanship—Cooperative Apple Culture.

The sympathetic show of the California State Floral Society will take place at the Fair Grounds on the 24th, 25th and 26th October.

The San Francisco Chronicle of Thursday last stated that owing to the heavy shipments of potatoes from Utah and Colorado, Clay street west in that city is piled high with them.

Charles D. Smith, 15 years old, was admitted to the St. Charles Avenue section Wednesday at Visalia, Cal. He has a tumor in the cerebellum sinus, and this caused his dementia.

Ben Jones, Cal., sent 2,000,000 pounds of Santa Clara county produce East last week. 1,000 bushels turned the largest item, 8,100,000 pounds having been forwarded. The shipments for the corresponding week in 1884 were 4,000,000 pounds.

One of the surprising young men of San Fran., Cal., are taking of Loring's cooperative stock company and engaging in the growing of apples. If the fruit matures successfully 100 acres of land will be secured in some favorable locality and planted in Winter apples.

The Nevada Southern railway was sold to the Central Pacific at a public auction, Cal., to H. H. Anderson. The sale was made under a decree of the superior court. Anderson had been required to pay \$151,750. The amount due was \$120,000. Anderson will transfer the property to the Central and Eastern lines, was announced.

A favorite little girl, Mrs. J. A. Johnson of Alpine, Ore., left her home out west on the John Day country, taking with her a box of souvenirs belonging to her father. She went to Baker, where she was overtaken by an older sister of Alpine who brought news, and refused to give any reason why she abstained from the strange expedition.

Two hundred and twenty-eight divorces were granted in Montana during the year 1884, and of that number 107 were on the complaint of the wife, while only 10 were granted where it was found that the wife was to blame. Against the husband, 100 divorces were issued, and the average of 1,000 marriages licenses being issued. The percentage of divorce to marriage in the entire state was 12%.
