PHOENIX, ARIZONA. SHEEP POURING IN.

This Year Flock Owners Will Make Fortunes in the Valley.

Hon. W. J. Morgan of Navajo county arrived in town yesterday overland from Show Low. The trip at this time of the year is very much like an expedition to the north pole. The trai is one of the worst in Arizona and is made worse just now by 17 inches of snow. That part of it over Mount Reno is characterized as outrageous Each traveler has to repair the tral! as he goes along. It is filled with great rocks which render progress next to impossible especially after storms which wash in more rocks and wash cut the dirt between those which had been there. The traveler curiously repairs the trail by throwing in still more rocks. In the course of time naturally a great causeway will be built up there for the wonderment of future nerations whose scientists will speculate upon the origin of the great rocky ledge which will extend northeast and southwest through the eastern part of

Arizona. It will perhaps be thought to be a sort of Chinese wall. There is only one thing about the Journey, Mr. Morgan says, that makes the trip endurable and that is a solace only to those in whom the gambling instinct is strong. That is a perpetual anxiety in the mind of the traveler regarding his fate. He will be continual-ly speculating as to whether he is going to break down the next minute. If the milk in the com-posite jar stands too long the cream is liable to get mouldy, tough and leathery, thus rendering a complete incorporation of the fat globules impossible Some preservative will have to be used to destroy the lactic acid germs. An aliquot sample should be taken, i.e., a proportionate sample of each lot

f milk. This can best be accomplishd by using what is known as the "milk thief" or the "Scoville milk sampler," the latter is used at the college, and is in every way satisfactory. If, for in-stance, "A" brings 100 pounds of milk one day, and the next 200 pounds, then only half a much should be taken for sample the first day as is taken the second.

Many objections are offered against the Babcock test as a means of de-termining the butter fat of milk and its products. In most cases the ones who do the most kicking are the ones who understand least about the meth-od. The claim is made by the opponents of the Babcock test that no two operators can get the same result from the same sample of milk or cream. This appears to me to be speculation and has no foundation whatever. If the milk is the same in both cases and the operation is com pleted by competent men the results will be the same. Creamery patrons have told the writer that they could make more butter by keeping the milk at home even by the shallow pan method of skimming than they could by sending to the creamery. This may be true and it may not. The creamery operator has everything in his hands, and if he desires to be disnonest there is hardly any means to detect him if the shaving of the test is small. Dissatisfaction among creamery patrons may be due to the carelessness of the operator of the test or it may be due to improper care of the milk by the farmer. After testing thousands of samples by the Babcock method the farmer. writer has full faith in its results. A correct reading, however, depends upon certain things, some of which are, a representative sample, clean glassware, the graduation of which is correct, sulphuric acid of the proper strength, the speed of the machine, the length of time force is applied and method of adding the hot water. Careleasness in any of these details will result in a poor reading, if not an entirely inac-It is safe to say that in curate one.
