Local and Other Matters.

Thermometer 59 degrees F.

In the shade at 1 p.m. to-day. Fine.

Personal.—To-day we had an agreeable call from C. W. Penrose, Esq., the able and vivacious editor of the Ogden Junction.

Arrived.—Elder George Whitehead, of Ogden City, Utah, and sister-in-law, Miss Morris, gave us a call on the morning of the 31st inst., on their way to London, having arrived at Glasgow on the 5th from New York. They were in excellent health, although fatigued by travel.—*Millennial Star*, July 10.

Coming Home.—Elder David M. Stuart, accompanied by Elders Junius F. Wells, Joseph F. Simmons and Mathew W. Pratt, missionaries, and a small company of Saints, were to leave St. Louis for home to-day, August 2nd.

Jones.—David Jones, Richland, Colfax County, Nebraska, is anxious to learn the whereabouts of either of his two brothers, William and James Jones. He states that William Jones came to this city, from Wales, about twenty years ago. David is anxious to join his brothers.

Destroyed One of Them.—Mr. S. P. Crompton, of the Eleventh Ward, in this city, destroyed one of his hives of bees that were affected with foul brood, last night. This is a step in the right direction, and all bee-keepers who have any signs of this disease in their apiaries should do likewise.

Back Again.—Last night Henry Miller and Joseph Reynolds, jailbirds, were intoxicated and engaged in a fight. Reynolds cut a gash in the forehead of Miller, a rock. Both were arrested, and, to-day, each were fined \$20, by Justice Eyer, and, in default, they are in their usual position, in the chain gang.

A Paltry Act.—Dr. Russell, of the 12th Ward, informs us that on two different occasions, one of them happening last night, some person upturned his lot and pulled up a quantity of choice roots. The act does not appear to be prompted by a desire to steal, the roots not being yet sufficiently matured for use. He feels much annoyed and purposes prosecuting the party when discovered.

Y. M. M. I. A.—A. G. McCleave writes from Leeds, July 27—

"Our Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association at this place is in a lively condition. City Council.—The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding.

Petition of R. B. Chisholm, for leave to pile material, on the sidewalk and street, in front of the National Bank building, during the progress of repairs on that structure; granted.

Petition of H. Wagner, Jacob Alf, J. Creaser, and A. Levy, beer saloon keepers, asking that they never infringe upon the City ordinance relating to their business by disposing of spirituous liquors in any way, and asking the Council not to increase the beer selling license because other beer sellers broke the law, by disposing of spirituous liquors under cover of their beer business; laid on the table pending a report from a committee to whom was referred another and previous petition and communication, relating to the same subject.

Petition of Fritz Fullreide, representing that he was an invalid, from kidney disease, compelled to give up his beer saloon business, and asking that the amount for an unexpired term of his license be refunded; granted.

Petition of Thomas Fenton, suggesting to the Council the propriety of sending for one hundred or one hundred and fifty pairs of English sparrows, the approaching Fall, he believes of the opinion that they would prove beneficial as insect destroyers, as they had been in New York, Jersey City and other places; referred to committee on improvements.

Mr. Fred Carter was granted an auctioneer's license for the term of one year.

Petition of Dr. Monroe, representing, on account of the general depression, business was dull at the Warm Springs Bath House, and asking that a reduction of the rent be made, until such times as business revived; referred to committee on claims.

Petition of Walker Brothers and others, bankers, merchants, lawyers, asking that certain privileges be granted free of additional tax, to consumers of water from the waterworks, such as a bath, street sprinkling, water-closets, &c. The petition was accompanied by a letter of endorsement from the superintendent of waterworks, Mr. T. W. Elliker; referred to committee on waterworks.

Petition of Julia Sanberg and others, for a bridge to be placed over the North Temple Street culvert, near its mouth; granted and the supervisor instructed to place the spot indicated a foot bridge, protected by side rails.
