Cherry Unheard From—C. C. Cherry, the collector for Mabey Bros., whose whereabouts are one of the mysteries of the times, has not been heard from or located up to date.

Interested in Utah Projects—Porter B. Fitzgerald and family of Chicago are at the Knutsford. Mr. Fitzgerald is largely interested in irrigation and land improvements in Utah, and will be in town for two weeks.

Mrs. Ballington Booth—Mrs. Ballington Booth will be in this city on the 22nd inst., on a transcontinental trip, when she will visit the Utah state prison and address the convicts, by the special courtesy of Warden Pratt.

Excursion North Today—The Short Line is giving a summer excursion today, Aug. 10, to northern Utah and Idaho points, on a very cheap basis. The time limit is 15 days for points south of Pocatello, and 30 days for northeast and western points.

Sixty Prices Still Unclaimed—Sixty prizes, some of them cash prizes, remain unclaimed in the office of the secretary of the Real Estate association at the Chamber of Commerce block. Unless called for by tomorrow night, they will be all turned back into the treasury of the association.

Tomatoes Condemned—City Food Inspector Fradler found 190 cans of tomatoes, one at a West Temple street store, in a state of fermentation. He punctured them all, and condemned them.
