LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Bryant school children will have a debate Monday morning on whether victory by Japan or Russia will be best for civilization.

A Scandinavian meeting will be held in the Assembly hall tomorrow afternoon immediately after the meeting of the general conference.

The members of the French class in the high school gave their French play in the hall last evening before a good audience and with success.

City Supt. D. H. Christensen of the city schools expects the school pupils to plant on Arbor day about 12,000 trees, with many flower beds in addition.

The University Chronicle dance at Salt Lake last evening was well attended and enjoyed, and a regular dance given by the management of the resort will be the feature this evening.

Idaho people in this city say that sheep are being driven into the mountains 20 days earlier than usual; and at the head waters of the Snake river, the sheepmen are following the snow.

The regular meeting of the Women's Democratic club will be held at the residence of Mrs. Elizabeth Cohen, 407 Second East street, Wednesday, April 12, at 2:30 p. m. All Democratic women are invited.

Karl Hopkins, Daniel Alexander and Dale Parke won in yesterday afternoon's debating contest at the University, preliminary to the contest with Colorado college at Colorado Springs. Harold Stevens was chosen first alternate.

The state board of sheep inspectors resolved yesterday that "It shall be the duty of sheepmen before entering the state, to notify a federal inspector, and, after entering the state, it shall be their duty to notify the state inspector of the district entered."

The management of the Country club has arranged to have a convention meet the 10 o'clock train from town, Saturday and Sunday mornings, so that clubmen will not have to walk the distance between the street car line and the club house.

Spillman writes Manager Harris of the Commercial club from Goldfield that Utah merchants have the opportunity of their lives, and that they ought to take advantage of the chance to do business in the great camp. He urges shipments of flour there immediately, as they can be disposed of at good prices. The freight blockade continues by the Tonopah route.

Senator W. K. Walton of the Portland exposition says that it was intended to give the drawing of the plans of the state building to Salt Lake architects; but on account of the shortness of the time in which the building was to be erected, it was found impossible to wait until the commission returned and could make arrangements with home talent. As the Virginian Senator says it is old Colonial, a style obtaining a good deal in this city.

At the afternoon session of the Beekeepers' association yesterday, a committee consisting of President E. S. Lowrey, John R. Fox, James Nielsen and Richard Gale, was appointed to confer with the smelter people in regard to adjusting the claims for losses of bees sustained by beekeepers because of the smelter and that they also decided by the association to ignore future world's fairs and devote more time to preparing exhibits for the Utah state fairs.

The board of education has given to two policemen employed as trunk carriers the task of getting the names of all boys and girls between the ages of eight and sixteen years who are not in regular attendance at the city schools. In cases where it can be proven that parents are to blame for the failure to take advantage of the educational opportunities offered by the city, they will be summoned into court and given a chance to receive fines or imprisonment.

That the upper Snake valley is booming is evident from the statements of visitors from Rexburg, where it is said \$100,000 worth of contracts for buildings have been let, and where there are now 2,500 population. The Fremont State academy has an attendance of 400, and new comers are showing up continually in the way of settlers. In fact, the entire country throughout is peopling up wonderfully and there are now 100 postoffices in Bingham and Fremont counties.
