BANKERS CHANGE FRONT.

Ever since Congress met, the telegraphic columns of the American newspapers have been filled with reports of vicissitudes concerning the proposed reformation of the currency.

Bankers and financiers in the trans-montain region are almost a unit in urging the free release of silver as the most feasible, rapid and effective method of accomplishing the desired object.

Under the present national banking system, government bonds in the equivalent of about \$10,000,000 are deposited as security for each dollar of currency issued by a bank.

From a western standpoint this appears to be a remarkable change of front on the part of the bankers of the East.
