NEW SYSTEM OF WELDING.

NEW SYSTEM OF WELDING. A Frenchman has demonstrated the possibility of uniting metals by heat without the use of either flux or com-pression. The process is called the ox-yacetylene and produces a heat from about 2,000 to 6,300 degrees F. By this process, it is claimed, all metals can be so perfectly united that when smoothed the joint cannot be discerned. Blowholes and other castings can be repaired, making them 95 per cent as strong as they were originally. Recent-ly the United States government has purchased a \$5,000 plant for use in the Brooklyn navy-yard and has also or-dered a portable plant to be used on shipboard. The process is the discovery of a Frenchman named Bournoville, who invented the compressed acetylene.
