# CARS COLLIDED ON A CURVE.

There Were Seventy Passengers and The Vehicles Were Traveling Along At a Very Rapid Rate.

Pelham, N. H., Sept. 6 .- Through a head-on collision today two electric cars, each running, it is said, at a rate of more than 20 miles an hour, four persons were killed and 19 were so seriously injured that they are under physicians' care and several of these are expected to die. As there were 70 passengers on the two cars, many others received cuts and minor wounds which did not prevent their going to their homes

The accident occurred on the line which runs through this town between Lowell and Nashua, and one of the cars which was coming from the latter city was nearly filled with people on their way to a summer resort. Persons who witnessed the collision stated afterward that it came so unex-pectedly that it seemed some minutes before the passengers realized what had happened. All were silent and the passengers made no outcry, appearing dazed by the shock.

### Insursectos Scattered.



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

### Another New Line.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 6 .- A mortgage secure bonds on a new railway from Columbus, O., to Maysville, Ky., to connect east and west trunk lines in the north with the Chesapeake & Ohio, the Louisville & Nashville and other southern lines, was recorded yesterday, and today it is announced that this new line will also extend 90 miles from Maysville, Ky., through Jackson, Pike, Floyd and Martin counties in Kentucky, so as to form an outlet to the coal fields on the west side of the Big Sandy river. One Great Northern Coal and Coke company, recently organized, with a capitalizaton of \$10,000,000, owns 00,000 acres of coal lands in that reand is said to be promoting the rallway. It is proposed to ship coal by rail as well as down the Big Sandy and Ohio rivers, as has been done for years. It is said that the Great Northern Coal and the Pittsburg Coal companies will then control the coal trade from Pennsylvania and all States along the Ohio river to New Orleans.

### Boiler Burst.

Bloomington, Ill., Sept. 6.—While passing Greenview today at full speed the boller of a locomotive pulling a Kansus City fast freight train, west-bound, on the Chicago & Alton rail-way, exploded, killing Engineer Frank J. Unton of Bloomington, probably fa-tally injuring Fireman C. C. Kellner of Bloomington, and severely hurting Brakeman J. A. Montgomery of Rood-house. Many cars were thrown in a house. ## Frauds in Oklahoma.

Stokes is un-der arrest and his bond has been fixed at \$4,500. The three indicted county commissioners, it is said, have fled the country.

## Yellow Eever in Mexico.

Monterey, Mex., Sept. 6.—A fund for the yellow fever sufferers of Lianares, where the disease is epidemic, has been started by prominent citizens of this city. Business has been partially sus-pended, and those who are not afflicted with the fatal disease are idle, though not in direct need as yet. Scores of fever cases have been reported, and among the afflicted are the mayor and als secretary.

It is said that stones were thrown at the royal carriage, one strik-ing the king in the face, and a pistol was fired from a neighboring window. It is also rumored that the Sixth Servian regiment, notorious for the part it played in the recent regicides, has been ordered to Nish ordered to Nish.

### Gen. Foote is Ill.

San Francisco, Sept. 7.-Gen. Lucius H. Foote, is lying dangerously ill at his H. Foote, is lying dangerously ill at his residence in this city and his recovery is despaired of by the attending physi-cians. Gen. Foote represented the United States for years in South Amer-ica and for four years in the Orient. He was the first minister from this country to Korea.
