

FOUR KILLED IN TROLLEY WRECK.

Nineteen Others were Injured, With the Likelihood that Some of them Will Die.

CARS COLLIDED ON A CURVE.

There were Seventy Passengers and The Vehicles Were Traveling Along at a Very Rapid Rate.

Phelham, N. H., Sept. 6.—Through a head-on collision today two electric cars, each running, it is said, at a rate of more than 20 miles an hour, four persons were killed and 19 were seriously injured that they are under physicians' care and several of these are expected to die. As there were 70 passengers on the two cars, many others received cuts and minor wounds which did not prevent their going to their homes.

The accident occurred on the line which runs through this town between Lowell and Nashua, and one of the cars which was coming from the latter city was nearly filled with people on their way to a summer resort.

The collision was due, according to the officials of the road, to a misunderstanding of the starter's orders by the motorman of the car bound for Nashua. The car started and endeavored to rectify the mistake by shutting off the power and trying to recall the Nashua-bound car, but it failed.

The accident occurred on a curve on either side of which were long stretches of straight track. The dead as reported up to 10 o'clock tonight are:

DEAD.

Charles H. Gilbert, 50 years, Nashua. Gabriel Collett, 25 years, Nashua. George C. Andrews, 36 postmaster, Hudson, N. H. Samuel Mays, motorman on the Nashua car, Hudson.

IN HOSPITALS.

As the accident took place at some distance from any large city, the injured were distributed among the hospitals of Lowell. The accident occurred on Hudson, Phelham & Salem division of the New Hampshire Traction company's electric railway.

The car from Nashua, carrying 54 passengers for Cannonville lake, a summer resort, approached the curve a quarter of a mile west of Phelham street at a terrific speed, accompanied by a down grade. The cars met on a curve, neither motorman seeing the approaching car until too late to avoid a collision.

There was no time for the passengers to escape by jumping when the cars came together with a force that threw the westbound car directly upon the forward part of the other, crushing the top of the car down upon the passengers and pinning those occupying the first three seats in the wreckage.

Persons who witnessed the collision stated afterward that it came so unexpectedly that it seemed some minutes before the passengers realized what had happened. All were silent and the passengers made no outcry, appearing dazed by the shock.

PROMPT RELIEF.

Near the accident were a number of campers who at once rushed to the scene. With crowbars and other instruments the wrecked roofs of the cars were pried up and the imprisoned passengers released.

Not one of the passengers on the two cars escaped injury of some sort, although a number were not seriously hurt.

Another New Line.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 6.—A mortgage to secure bonds on a new railway from Columbus, O., to Mayesville, Ky., to connect east and west trunk lines in the north with the Chesapeake & Ohio, the Louisville & Nashville and other southern lines, was recorded yesterday and today it is announced that this new line will also extend 90 miles from Mayesville, Ky., through Jackson, Pike, Floyd and Martin counties in Kentucky, as to form an outlet to the coal fields on the west side of the Big Sandy river. The Great Northern Coal and Coke company, recently organized, with a capitalization of \$10,000,000, owns 5000 acres of coal lands in that region, and it is said to be negotiating the new railway. It is proposed to ship this coal by rail as well as down the Big Sandy and Ohio rivers, as has been done for years. It is said that the Great Northern Coal and Coke Pittsburg coal companies will then control the coal trade from Pennsylvania and all States along the Ohio river to New Orleans.

Boiler Burst.

Bloomington, Ill., Sept. 6.—While passing Greenville today at full speed the boiler of a local passenger train on the Chicago & Alton railway, exploded, killing Engineer Frank Kelly, fatally injuring Fireman C. C. Kellner of Bloomington, and severely hurting Fireman J. A. Montgomery of Rockford. Many cars were thrown in the air and broken. The track was blocked for several hours.

Three Injured.

Philadelphia, Sept. 6.—In a head-on collision between trolley cars at Fort Washington on the line between Philadelphia and Allentown, tonight, three persons were probably fatally hurt and over a score of others sustained more or less serious injuries.

Frauds in Oklahoma.

Washington, Sept. 6.—A telegram to Secy. Hitchcock from United States District Atty. Horse Speed of Oklahoma says the United States grand jury has found three indictments against Contractors Fred A. and three county commissioners for Ritoa county for making false vouchers and false certificates for the purpose of defrauding the government in connection with the building of bridges. Stokes is under arrest and his bond has been fixed at \$4,500. The three indicted county commissioners, it is said, have fled the country.

Yellow Fever in Mexico.

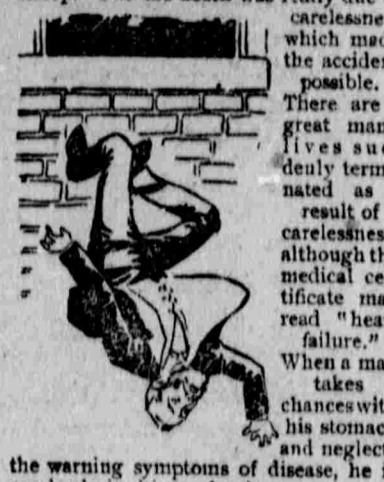

Buried Alive.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 6.—Mike Jessen, John Cranz and Sabin, three laborers, were crushed to death by the caving in of a 15-foot bank at the excavation for the site of a new hotel on Sixth and San Joaquin streets. The men were buried alive under tons of earth. John Bunch, another laborer, working in the trench, saw the slide of earth start and barely escaped. His legs were caught by the cave-in, but he was pulled out with slight injuries.

Indian Humanity.

Carson, Nev., Sept. 6.—A strange story of a murder and suicide comes from Schurz, a hamlet on the line of the Carson & Colorado railway road. An Aged Indian named George Sam, unable to witness the sufferings of his young son, killed the lad with a shotgun and then, placing the muzzle of the gun at his own head, discharged the remaining barrel.

Murdered Mysteriously.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 6.—The police have another murder mystery to solve as a result of the finding of the body of an unidentified man in the river at the foot of Lucas avenue. A bullet hole between the ears leads the police to believe that the murder was committed for the purpose of robbery. The body was found about noon by Capt. Patrick Burke of the tug Robert E. Lee. The shoes worn by the dead man were marked "D. A. Pitts, Cordoba, Ga." The body had evidently been in the water about 10 days.

Pestering Peter.

Vienna, Sept. 6.—Special dispatches give an unconfirmed report of an attempt on King Peter's life at Nish on Saturday. It is said that stones were thrown at the royal carriage, one striking the king in the face and a pistol was fired from a neighboring window. It is also rumored that the Sixth Serbian regiment, notorious for its name, played in the recent regicides, has been ordered to Nish.

Gen. Foote is Ill.

San Francisco, Sept. 7.—Gen. Lucius H. Foote, is lying dangerously ill at his residence in this city and his recovery is despaired of by the attending physicians. Gen. Foote represented the United States for years in South America and for four years in the Orient. He was the first minister from this country to Korea.

Changes in Organization.

New York, Sept. 7.—Changes in the organization and methods of the National Civic Federation have been decided on by the executive committee, which will be discussed at a conference of the federation in Chicago on October 14 and 15. This will be preliminary to a week's international industrial congress of the federation at St. Louis next June.

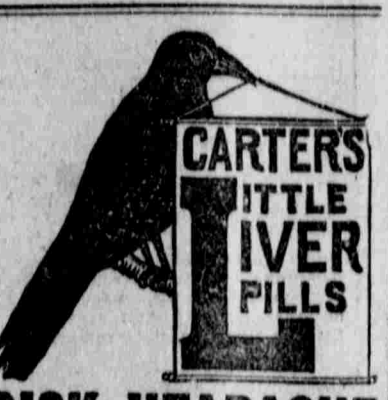
Bogotan Canal Commission.

Bogota, Colombia, Tuesday, Sept. 1.—The senate has appointed a commission to prepare a bill authorizing the government to negotiate a canal treaty without violating the constitution, but the government has not presented to congress a message, which is necessary, asking for reforms in the constitution to meet the wishes of the United States regarding tribunals, the sovereign control of the canal strip and the hundred-year lease. The general feeling is favorable to a new treaty.

No Unseemly Haste.

Rome, Sept. 6.—With reference to the report that Cardinal Moran of Sydney, N. S. W., has been offered the post of papal secretary of state, it can be said that Pihx X has taken no decision regarding the appointment of a state secretary. A cardinal who is on the best terms with the pontiff, having been one of his warmest electors, said today to the Associated Press correspondent: "The holy father desires to become master of the whole mechanism of the vatican before appointing a secretary of state. Meanwhile all officials em-

played by Pope Leo XIII have been retained, as none better than they could help the new pontiff in carrying out his purpose. "The new secretary of state will gradually replace them. But their removal will not be a punishment. On the contrary they will be rewarded for their services by promotion. The new secretary of state will choose men entirely trusted by him, and who will be capable of collaborating with him in the new direction of the vatican's policy. The

Manila, Sept. 7, 6 p. m.—Lieut. Sutton of the constabulary was murdered by a mob of native policemen at Cebu a few days ago while attempting to arrest a policeman for disobedience of orders. His assailants were promptly arrested and jailed.

Insectos Scattered.

Manila, Sept. 7, 6 p. m.—A body of scouts and constabulary combined have succeeded in scattering the insectos who were reported a few days ago causing trouble in Cavite province in the district fronting on Laguna de Bay. They have been driven out of the mountain range to which they had fled for shelter when routed by the constabulary in an engagement which took place last week. After dispersing them the force returned and captured their camp, together with a large amount of supplies and ammunition.
