The president, in immaculate evening clothes, presented a striking contrast to the men of the mission, who rose to their feet and cheered him as he enter-et the iong, church-like room from the rear. Hundreds of resi-dents of the crowded neighborhood had heard of his coming, and braved the storm to give him a cheer as his automobile entered the alley at the back of the mission. FOURTEEN-FOOT SIPHON UNDER COLORADO RIVER

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 14 .- With th

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 14.—With the completion of a siphon 14 feet in diame-ter under the Colorado river at Yuma, the United States reclamation service will have accomplished a feat unique in American engineering. The siphon will carry water diverted from Yuma dam, 14 miles away, under the Colorado river, to irrigate 55,000 acres in the Yu-ma valley. Two shafts each 10 feet deep will be sunk and connected under the river by a drift tunnel.
