## DIED.

At Smithfield, Utah Territory, at half-past 8 p.m., on Tuesday, July 18th, 1882, after a sickness of several weeks, DOROTHY GILL, wife of Francis Sharp. Deceased was born at Walsbridge, Kent, County of Durham, England, on the 21st of April, 1840; was baptized and

confirmed a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Newcastle-on-Tyne conference, England, February 19th, 1855; emigrated in 1852, arriving in Salt Lake City on the 18th of October; lived in Farmington Ward till the spring of 1855; then moved to Smithfield. She was the mother of twelve children, nine of whom are living. She lived and died firm in the principles of the Gospel.—[Com.]

In South Jordan Ward, Salt Lake County, Utah, on Saturday, July 22nd, from the effects of an injury received accidentally SARAH BLAKE, wife of John Blake, aged 61 years, 8 months and 28 days.

At EastOUNT, July 23, ANN COOK, wife of Mark Cook and daughter of Charles and Elizabeth Evans, born January 24th, 1823, at High Littleton, Somersetshire, England; baptized in 1849, emigrated to Utah in 1853; had been a resident of EastOUNT ever since until her death. She was the mother of 14 children, six sons and eight daughters, six of whom are living, two sons and four daughters. She was a kind and affectionate wife and loving mother, beloved by all who knew her.

At Meadow, Millard County, July 24, 1882, at 6.25 p.m., of inflammation of the bowels, SARAH, wife of Abraham Greenbalgh.

Deceased was born February 27, 1831, at Pendlebury near Manchester, Lancashire, England, (thus being aged 51 years, four months and 27 days). She was baptized into the Church March 25th, 1847, and emigrated with her husband to Utah in 1853. She gave birth to a son at Keokuk and carried him in her arms over the plains, arriving in Salt Lake City on the 8th of October. She was the mother of 9 children and died in full faith of the Gospel, leaving a husband, 4 children, 11 grandchildren and a host of friends to mourn her loss.—[Com.]

At Ferron, Emery County, Utah, July 17th, 1882, of inflammation, JOHN LEROY, son of Joseph B. and Anna P. Caldwell, born at Gunnison, Utah, Sept. 24th, 1877.

## OBITUARY.

JAMES ABBOTT LEMMON, late of Northrop, Rockville Ward, Kane County, Utah, departed this life June 23, 1882.

Brother Lemmon was born March 12, 1815, in one of the Southern States. He was driven with the Saints from Jackson County, Missouri, in 1833, though he was not a member of the Church at that time, but was baptized soon afterwards, and suffered the persecutions and drivings in common with the Saints, until he found a resting place in the Rocky Mountains. He settled early in Fort Ephraim, Sanpete County, where he had charge of the Elders' Quorum. On or about the 15th of May, 1857, he was ordained a president in the 47th Quorum of Seventies, was second in the council, which position he held till the day of his death. In the fall of 1861 he was called on a mission to Dixie, which mission he never abandoned. He settled at Northrop, at the forks of the Virgin River, above Rockville. He leaves a wife and several grandchildren and great grand children.—[Com.]


