LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Thermometer 82° in the shade at one o'clock today.

THEATRE.—The abilities and professional accomplishments of Mr. G. D. Chaplin and Miss Jean Clara Walters are such as to merit a far larger house than assembled last night. The lady and gentleman are really superior players, and with versatile capabilities, and evidently quite at home in tragedy, comedy, drama, comedy or burlesque. They play, sing, or dance with ease, ability, elasticity, spirit and vigor, and it is no difficult for them to afford a large amount of satisfaction to even a critical audience. In the dances which fall in her parts, Miss Walters acquires herself very gracefully and pleasingly, and a score of them last night she introduced a series of grotesque dances that drew the applause. Her "Judy" and "Pocahontas" were especially well received. "Pocahontas" was a decided success. If the support were efficient, the Chaplins' earlier performance would take a much higher rank on our boards, and would deserve very liberal patronage. Messrs. Graham and Harris are excellent dancers in their usual manner to satisfy the audience.

This evening, for the benefit of Mr. Chaplin, the drama of "Lady Thornhurst" will be the programme. The story from which the play is dramatised is a powerful and interesting one, and a highly attractive performance may be expected. Mr. Chaplin enacts the part of "Lord Thornhurst," and Miss Walters those of "Mrs. Capt. Holm," and "Lady Thornhurst." Messrs. Graham and Harris also appear and assume the characters of "Sir Thomas Todhunter" and "Sir Victor Cheswick." It is not often that two so good performers as Mr. Chaplin and Miss Walters play in our theatre at one time. They deserve encouragement.

Post Office.—Preparations are making, we are informed, for the removal of the post office to the premises next door to Barratt's furniture store, a short distance north of the Bank of Denver.

THE OREY TRIAL.—The evidence had all been given in and the argument in this case was nearly concluded by noon to-day, and it was expected that the judge would sum up and give the case to the jury this afternoon.

IMPROVEMENTS.—Bowering & Crow and William Shires are making improvements in their premises, south of the Constitution buildings. The first named have put up two and the latter one fine projecting window, as well as making other and corresponding alterations. Those alterations render the buildings in keeping with the others on that block, which do not show the original "shanties" have been demolished, presents a very handsome and business like appearance. CASES.—There were two other cases before Collier's, of the same kind, in the Justice's court yesterday. A fine of \$100 was imposed in one case and \$50 in another. We understand there are several other cases of a similar nature to come up shortly.

RAILROAD.—We are informed, by Bishop W. W. Cluff, that the prospects for the early completion of the Coalville and Echo R. R. are now very promising. The grading is finished, all the ties are ready, and an agent is now in the East purchasing iron for the road. Bishop Cluff is authorized to let the contract to do the necessary bridging on the line, and everything connected with the construction of the road moves along as prosperously as expected. It will be finished and in running order sometime in October. The Coalville and Echo R. R. will be in the vicinity of the Crisman coal mine, about a mile and a half above the aforementioned towns.

DANGEROUS.—This morning some parties foolishly set fire to a large pile of rubbish, including carpenter's shavings, etc., on East Temple Street, a short distance south of Third South. Such a practice is severely reprehensible, as in the case of high wind it might prove the cause of buildings catching fire, resulting in extensive destruction of property and even life.

POLICE COURT.—Philip Collier, who was arrested on Wednesday on a charge of I. C., and who demanded a jury trial, was before Justice Clinton and a jury yesterday afternoon. Messrs. Maxwell and C. M. Hawley, Jr., counsel for the defense, asked for a continuance of the case in order to give time for the procuring of witnesses for the defense, by whom the latter proposed to prove an alibi. Judge Hoge for the prosecution, opposed the continuance, and he grounds that the defense had not given the names of the witnesses alluded to, and by whom it had been alleged that it could be proved that Collier had not visited the house of ill fame, where the crime preferred against him was alleged to have been committed. Mr. Hawley said the statute did not require that the names of witnesses should be given. They might be tampered with, and he might have asked for the names of the latter being tampered with. Here the altercation became so warm that one of the legal gentlemen threw some law books at the other, and was fined by the Justice \$25 for contempt of court. The officers of the court prevented the quarrel from proceeding further, when the belligerent parties withdrew and apology having been made and accepted, returned into court.

Mr. Maxwell requested, as the unpleasant matter had been so entirely arranged between the parties concerned, that the fine be remitted, which was agreed to by the Judge, the latter expressing his pleasure at the pleasant termination of the disagreeable occurrence.

The trial was then proceeded with, and after hearing the evidence, etc., the case was given to the jury, who rendered a sealed verdict, with the understanding that it was to be opened this morning at 10 o'clock.

The verdict of the jury was that Collier be fined \$100. The latter gave notice of an appeal to the Probate Court.
