

> MISSIONARY COUNCIL. The second day's session of the Missionary Council of the Protestant Episcopal Courch opened this morning at the Epiphany (hurch, Bishop Whipple presided. The committee to whom was referred the report of the board of managers on missions, submitted a report which was adopted, recommending the appointment of a representative colored man on the board.

An address on the missionary work in Africa was made by Rev. Mr. Phompson and Rev. Mr. Moore. The latter is a full blooded negro from Cape Pulmus district in Africa.

The annual report of the Third Asistant Postmaster-General, shows the total cost of the postal service for the last fiscal year (inclusive of the amount earned by the subsidized Pacific railroad companies for mail transportation), was \$57,126,004. The postal and money order receipts amounted to \$52,005,176, leaving a dedicincy of \$5,490,828. This deficiency is owing mainly, to the great extension of the free delivery service, and the increase of the railway mail transportation. Statistics of letters, etc., transported during the year, which are the first accurate statistics ever published by the department, show letters mailed, 709, the total cost of the postal service for ever published by the department, show letters mailed, 769,-800,000; postal cards mailed, 372,-200,000; newspapers and periodicals mailed, 1,063,100,000; picces of third and fourth class matter, 372,-

Total, 3,578,000,000. Third Assistant Postmaster General recommends that in some of the larger cities a pneumatic tube or some equ.valent underground system of trans-porting mails be adopted; that the present contract for letter sheet en-velopes be rescinded, and that as a substitute for the franking privilege, members of Congress have an annual allowance of money for the pur chase of postage stamps with which to official matter sent in the mails. AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

The Supreme Court, through Chief Justice Fuller, has rendered on opin on of unusual interest to holders o lite insurance policies. Thomas L. Hume, of the District of Columbia, died in 1881, totally insolvent, but leaving \$35,000 in life insurance policies. The policies were by their terms payable either to the widow or children of deceased. The administrators and creditors of flume's estate sought to force the application of the proceeds of the policies to the payment of debts due creditors on the ground that the premlams were paid by Hume by a fraudulent transfer of his in solvent estate. The Supreme Court solds the beneficiaries are entitled to all proceeds of the policies without any deduction whavever on account of premiums paid, holding that the husband and father has the full right to insure his life in the interest of his wife and children and that where such policies are affected in the name of the beneficiaries, they are no part of the estate of deceased insolv part of the estate of deceased insolv ent and therefore cannot be regarded as a fraudulent assignment of any part of his estate when so affected.
