AUSTRIA.

Mediatory conference.

VIENNA, 18.-A conference, respecting mediation, was held by the representatives of neutral powers at the foreign office on Tuesday last, All the ambassadors were present. The basis proposed is as follows: The neutrals to acquiesce in the annexation of Luxembourg and to acknowledge William as Emperor of Germany; France to pay 1,200,000,000 francs, to raise two frontier fortresses, and cede the district of Alsace to Germany. It is said that France would pay more money rather than cede one mile of territory.

Why the Bombardment has been Delayed-Germans Short of Food. VERSAILLES 17 .- The delay in the bombardment of Paris is caused, partly, by a quarrel between Generals Blumenthal and Von Roon. The latter wished to use army horses to bring up the guns while the former insisted it was impossible to spare them.
