The decision in the Sweet case will settle these important questions: First, the character of lands which the state can hold under the grant of the enabling act. Second, how the character of these lands is to be determined. In view of the foregoing facts, it is vitally important to the state that an absolutely correct decision be had in the Sweet case. To the end that such a decision may be obtained, we are of the opinion that the state should take steps to assist Mr. Sweet in making his defense.
