Washington, Oct. 27.—President Roosevelt today signed a proclamation creating Loch Katrine a bird reserve in Big Horn basin, Wyoming. The reserve embarces an area of about 5,500 acres, in the midst of which is the reservoir of the Shoshone Irrigation company. In recent years since this reservoir was built all manner of wild ducks have frequented this locality, and it has become a notorious breeding ground for different kinds of edible water fowl. The reserve was created at the request of the Auduborn society, which has been instrumental in having other reserves created in many other states along the coast. AMERICAN MARKSMEN BEAT AUSTRALIANS

Washington, Oct. 27.—President Roosevelt has been made acquainted through a report submitted to the navy department by Lieutenant Harris Laning of some details of splendid work of the battliship fleet rifle team in defeating the Melbourne, Australia, Rifle club, said in the report to be probably as strong a team as could be put up in Australia. The navy team of riflemen also bear a team in Sdyney, but were defeated by one form Auckland by a small margin. The contest with the Melbourne club was held on the 3rd of September, under very unfavorable conditions, the score resulting in a total of 1,414 for the Americans and 1,369 for the Australians. In this match the fleet team used the pointed bullets, and this undoubtedly helped the American score, but the match, Lieutenant Laning says, was really won by Allen, Thomson, Griffin, Voester, Stover and Jones.

The highest score was made by Corporal Farquaharson of the marine corps of the Connecticut, who made 29 out of a possible 165, and thereby secured for his vessel the temporary possession of the Auckland trophy, which is held by that ship, a representative of which made the highest score in the match against any British or colonial team. Firing in all the matches was at 20, 500 and 600 yards.

At Sydney the fleet rifle team defeated a team made up from councils of the National Rifle association and the Motropolitan association. The match was most one-sided and the fleet feam outshot their opponents at all ranges, defeating them by nearly 6½ points per man. The fleet team, Lieutenant Laning says, shot splendidly, and the local riflemen said that the score put up by it could not be surpassed by any team of 20 men selected from all Australia. The high score was made by Midshipman Stover, 102 out of a possible 105. The total scores were: Fleet team, 1,884; Australia, 1,776.

Washington, Oct. 28.—The Spanish debt of \$599,850 awarded to certain citizens of this country under a treaty of zens of this country under a treaty of Feb. 17, 1834, with Spain, has been finally liquidatde, according to the annual report of the register of the treasury which was made public yesterday. Spain has been paying annual interest on the amount since the treaty and this year the Spanish government transmitted \$570,000 in liquidation of the debt, The principal has been paid over three times in interest.

CASTAWAY IN SOUTH SEAS. Seven Chinese Tell Story of Their Trials and Hardships.

San Francisco, Oct. 28 .- A story of hardships as castaways in the South seas is told by seven Chinese who ar-rived on the steamer Manchuria from Hongkong. 

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
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
