LOCAL BRIEFS.

Building in State Street—The American Stoker company is erecting 30 feet frontage of one story store buildings on State street, north of the Elite theater, to cost \$8,000.

Visiting Garages—The students of the Y. M. C. A. automobile school have completed their shop work and lecture courses, and are now inspecting the various garages about the city.

An Evening With Dickens—Principal P. P. Nichols of the Price High school, and Miss Alexander, will give an entertainment this evening, entitled, "An Evening With Dickens," in the First Methodist church, for the benefit of the school.

Meghetti Begins Work—Excavation has begun on east Third South street, for P. P. Meghetti's \$30,000 building, adjoining the Colonial theater. Part of the ground floor is so designed that it may be used for theatrical purposes. The floors above are arranged for hotel purposes. The building will be of cement and firebrick.

Twenty Tread Burning Desert—Twenty candidates were initiated into the Mystic Shrine last night at Masque Shrine. There were several hundred Shriners present to take a hand in the program. A banquet followed, at which Rev. E. J. Goshen acted as toastmaster. George H. Dorn, L. D. Morris, L. D. Patterson and L. L. Baker responded.

Busy at Big Sewer—City Engineer Kelsey put a force of men to work today cleaning out the intercepting sewer at Seventh South. First South and South Temple streets where sand had washed in, almost filling it up and stopping the flow through the sewer. He is doing the work under the orders of the city engineer, who gave him the work.

Assessed Valuation Increased—The assessed valuation on city real estate will be increased this year from 6 to 10 percent, according to the county assessor who is checking up the returns of his deputies. This will particularly refer to property in the business district. In other parts of the city the valuation is about the same and the assessment of county property will not be raised.

New Steel Bridge Completed—The new steel bridge replacing the famous old White bridge across the Jordan river at North Temple street has been finished by the Minneapolis Steel and Machine company. It was inspected this week by the board of public works and will probably be accepted. It was given a test of 17 tons. The bridge is of concrete reinforced with steel and cost \$41,100.

Booklet Contract Let—The Century Printing company has the contract for 20,000 booklets containing the history of the G. A. R. by Col. Frank Stewart, with facts about the G. A. R. by Philip H. Hays. The booklets will be distributed over the country at large. The executive committee is discussing the proposed erection of a G. A. R. monument at the corner of "Welcome—G. A. R." on Ensign Peak.

Engineers Meet Friday—The next meeting of the Utah Society of Engineers will be held next Friday evening, in the physical room of the state university. The features of the evening will be a paper on "The Sewerage System in Salt Lake," by L. H. Krebs, assistant engineer of sewers of this city, and a paper by O. H. Skidmore, assistant electrical engineer of this city, on "The System of Filing Records in the City Engineer's Office in Salt Lake."

Eagles' Dance a Success—The last of the winter season dances given by the Order of Eagles was held last night in the Ogden, where nearly 1,000 people were present. The auditorium was handsomely decorated, while the costumes of the ladies were very attractive. The members of the order were in white tulle with blue and gold trimmings. Chairman W. Perry of the floor committee led the grand march at 9 o'clock. The occasion was much enjoyed.

THEORIES REGARDING DEATH OF W. D. ECOFF

One That He Took Poison by Mistake; Another in Financial Straits.

That W. D. Ecoff, whose dead body was found in a room at the Wilson hotel on Tuesday afternoon, either committed suicide because of financial difficulties, or took carbolic acid by mistake is the opinion expressed by officials who are investigating the case.

It has been learned that instead of his having \$700 or so on deposit in the bank, his account was overdrawn at least \$150 and it is also known that some checks he had issued were returned stamped "No Funds." Whether it was because of this he took his own life is a matter that still remains a mystery.

It has also developed that he was suffering from a severe throat and the suggestion has been made that when he sent for glycerine and carbolic acid he intended to use it as a gargle; that he poured the acid into a glass and then went to bed; that when he was awakened by his friend, C. Duckworth, he forgot the acid and, thinking it water, drank it by mistake.

The statement that he was engaged to marry Miss Katherine Condie appears to be erroneous as the young woman states positively they were not engaged, although they were good friends and he had called upon her frequently and she had accompanied him to places of amusement. Miss Condie says she met Ecoff last summer and since that time had been good friends but nothing more. She also says he called upon her Sunday and she with her sister went with him to dinner. They had and engaged to go to the theater on Monday and who can not account for the actions of the young man as he appeared to be as cheerful as ever when she saw him.

Last night the family of Ecoff was located in St. Louis and a brother, A. G. Ecoff, wired Justice Hanks as follows: "Hold body of William D. Ecoff. Will direct later." Justice Hanks stated today that he had received no further communication from the relatives of the dead man. The body is at Joseph Wm. Taylor's undertaking parlor and will be kept there pending further directions from the relatives.
